

#### Wishful Thinking: A Theological ABC,


by Frederick Buechner.

#### **First Reformed**

Intelligent and thoughtful films about modern Christianity are in rare supply, at least amongst those films that have come across my radar screen. A quick scan of IMDB's "100 Best Christian Movies" seems to confirm this thought– -1997's The Apostle looks like the last one...that is until now.


First Reformed, currently in theaters, is definitely not light summer fare, but is the best look at the struggle the modern American Christian faces that I've seen depicted on film.

Ethan Hawk plays a conflicted Protestant priest with a tragic history. His parish is a tiny historic church in upstate New York that is more museum than house of worship. Destined for destruction, the chapel is saved by a wealthy patron and falls under the umbrella of a nearby "mega-church" pastored by a charismatic preacher played by Cedric the Entertainer.

A young pregnant woman (portrayed by Amanda Seyfreid) and her troubled husband come into the priest's life and challenge his faith and outlook on the world in deep and disturbing ways. His dark night of the soul crashes into the young man's obsession with the death of the planet, and the mega-church's view of Christianity offers no solace for either.

Dark and demanding, this is a film that will force you to examine your faith, and maybe more importantly, your role as a Christian in our current American society.

Brueggemann shows readers how keeping the Sabbath allows us to break this restless cycle and focus on what is truly important: God, other people, all life. Perfect for groups or self-reflection, Sabbath as Resistance offers a transformative vision of the wholeness God intends, giving world-weary Christians a glimpse of a more fulfilling and simpler life through Sabbath observance."

# Choir of the West Reunion 2018



On July 1, Pacific Lutheran University hosted a reunion concert for the "Sparks Era" Choir of the West alumni. Dr. Richard Sparks directed PLU's premiere choir from 1983 to 2001. I experienced great joy singing in this choir as a student, and decades later, 137 of us spent one Saturday reminiscing and rehearsing together in order to perform in this special event.

You'll hear Lutheran classics including "A Mighty Fortress", "O Day Full of Grace," and "Beautiful Savior", as well as music spanning several time periods and cultures. We sing eleven songs in total – in five different languages – English, Latin, German, Russian, and Swedish!

I often feel closest to God when singing or listening to music. Give yourself an hour to take in these beautiful songs, and you'll see how the choral music tradition has inspired me. My hope is that watching this concert will inspire you, too!

## **BUILD THE VISION... SHARE THE VISION!**



#### August 2018 Vision-Aligned Building (VAB) Update

Our VAB Team has provided excellent guidance facing the unexpected prospect of at least an additional \$1.5 million to bring our facility up to the City of Seattle codes for earthquake, fire, and accessibility due to the cost and scope of our project. The way forward has not been easy to discern, with many variables, benefits, costs and risks to our mission to our finances and to our ability to connect positively with our wider community. These have had a huge impact on our congregation's ability to thrive in the future, so our congregation's patience and support as they work to find the best solutions—financially and for our vision is much appreciated.

#### 2018 Timeline

- Building Permit pre-submittal meeting with a Building Plans Examiner Supervisor at the City Building and follow-up consultation with Substantial Alteration experts at the City of Seattle (January)
- Seattle DCI plans examiner comes back with a determination that due to the general size of the new construction as currently proposed in our project, relative to the overall size of the building, our plans would likely trigger a Substantial Alteration determination. A Sub Alt decision would bring with it a series of code requirements that would potentially require significant additional design and constructions costs, and potentially reduce flexibility in how we go about achieving our VAB project goals. (January)

- Architecture team prepares possible alternative approaches and designs that could avoid a Substantial Alteration determination. The VAB Team meet with architect and our contractor to look at several alternative approaches to take as we move forward with the renovation work, including further phasing of different aspects of the project with the intent of avoiding a Substantial Alteration determination. (January)
- After several meetings, further research and much deliberation, VAB Team reaches consensus that we should move forward with the full project as envisioned in the strategic goals of the congregation and expressed in the most recent plans of the architect (February/March)
- However, since the costs of staying on track with the project as originally envisioned are significantly higher than anticipated due to the Substantial Alteration determination, by at least \$1.5 million, the question becomes focused on how to finance the plan without overly burdening the congregation with longterm debt.(February/March)
- The VAB Team meet with a land use attorney, architect, and project manager with experience in similar types of church projects. In these informal meetings, the Team received information and asked questions about successful church renovation projects that were financed partially or in whole through the sale of church property and/or development rights. (February/March)
- The project architect develops and presents several possible land rezoning and property development options that could provide additional revenue to meet the costs of the remainder of the VAB project. (April)

- O'Connor Consulting Group (Seattle) retained and provides an appraisal of the noncontiguous church-owned properties located across NW 25th Street from the primary church property. (May)
- VAB Team provides update of work to date and current status at Congregational meeting, and continues to meet almost weekly to discuss possible approaches. (June)
- Further conversations and meetings with project architect and contractor scheduled (took place after publication deadline) in order to vet possible approach suggested by VAB Team. (July)

Once the team, in consultation with our contractor and architect, has determined the best approach, we will schedule a Congregational informational meeting to address how to move forward in light of the financial challenges the Substantial Alteration determination presents.

Don Boelter, Parish Administrator (administrator@ourredeemers.net, 206-783-7900 x107) will continue to provide updates to the Church Council at its monthly meetings and to the Congregation via the monthly The Visitor and fellowship hall bulletin board space.

#### **Annual Meeting**

Thank you to everyone who came out to our Annual Congregational Meeting on Sunday, June 17. And also a big thanks to Latife Neu and Paul Wallstrom, who co-chaired the meeting and were recognized for their outstanding service to the church as outgoing Council Co-Presidents. Also recognized were Andrew Brissette, outgoing council member, and new at large-council members Emilie Purvine (had been serving as interim), Terrence Rindler, and Morgan Fowler. Amy Dahlgren was elected Treasurer, replacing Morgan who has served in that position for the past three years.

In addition to recognizing outgoing Council Members and voting for new members, Pastor Kathy gave her annual "State of the Church" remarks and Morgan presented the end of the fiscal year financial report. Both emphasized that we are seeing growth consistent with the goals outlined in the Strategic Plan, and that is great news, but that continued increases in giving and membership are needed in order to sustain our current staffing levels (this is also consistent with Strategic Plan).

Morgan and Don Boelter, Parish Administrator presented the 2018–19 Fiscal Year Budget for Congregational approval. The budget that was passed included 4.8% increase in spending over last year's budget. The largest line item increase was a Church Council initiated and approved 3.5% acrossthe-board staff salary increase. Finally, Vision-aligned Building Team members, Mike Hlastala and Don Boelter reviewed VAB Team work over the last year, and gave an update on the current status of the next phase of the VAB Project. There will be a future dedicated Congregational meeting held before moving forward with the next phase. Please see elsewhere in this newsletter for current information on status of VAB Project.

# National Youth Gathering

It was my joy to attend the National Youth Gathering with 276 young people and adult leaders from Northwest Washington. We gathered under the theme: THIS CHANGES EVERYTHING. What changes everything? Discovering the love, grace, and hope that has come into the world in the name of Jesus. Thirty-one thousand students, all in brightly colored tshirts bearing the gathering logo, took Houston by storm. Our first day was our synod congregations' Service Learning Day. I joined up with students from a few of our congregations and folks from a couple other synods in the Midwest. We were sent to a local Houston park where we spent time on three projects: reclaiming a sand volleyball court that had been invaded by deeply rooted weeds; gathering up trash around the park; and sweeping out all the picnic shelters.

Our second day was spent in the Interactive Learning Center – which had activities to appeal to every young person's interests – inviting our students to: "encounter God through a variety of learning styles and sensory experiences." You could do everything from building a picnic table, riding bumper cars, sailing on a zip line, participating in a coloring book prayer exercise, learning active Bible Story tell to chilling in Hammock Village. Day Three was our Synod Day. It was a day to spend time in scripture and to explore how God sends to us messengers who are, more times than not, strangers. We unpacked the story of the disciples on the Road to Emmaus where they discovered the stranger to be none other than Jesus. We asked the question how is Jesus showing up as stranger in our world? Every evening we gathered in the NRG Stadium for music and inspirational speakers. Many of the kids will tell you the speakers were the best part of the event. They understood the challenges facing our young people and knew how to relate to them. There were, shouts, tears and many standing ovations.

I must tell you what impressed me most was the young people themselves. I told our synod youth they made me so proud to be their Bishop. I was deeply moved by their deep desire for justice, their care for their neighbors, and their ability to articulate the kind of world they want to see. The Holy Spirit is indeed moving among the young people of this church. Their behavior is to be applauded. I spoke to police officers, Metro employees, bell hops and complete strangers who commented on how wonderful our young people were. It was powerful for me to witness how they cared for one another. They worked hard to see that no one was left out and comforted those kids who were having a hard time being away from home or facing the realities of what is happening in their own lives. I was moved by how comfortable and committed they are to inclusiveness. I left Houston with a renewed sense of hope for the church knowing God is forming a new generation of disciples who are well-fit to be the church now and into the future.

# Title of Course: Luther: Gospel, Law, and Reformation (from Great Courses)

# Sources: The Word and DVD with Professor Phillip Cary, Eastern University

Something about Prof. Cary: In his words: "I'm a member of an Anglican church. My favorite theologian is Martin Luther, but I'm not exactly a Lutheran. I've just read a whole lot of Luther and think he's understood something terribly important and beautiful about the Gospel of Jesus Christ. What Luther's theology has in common with Anglicanism is a tendency to find God in Word and Sacrament—in the external means of grace by which our Lord Jesus Christ gives himself to us".

Something about Luther: He was only one man—a humble monk and Bible professor—yet he sparked a religious rebellion that changed the course of history. What made his theology so explosive in 16th-century Europe? And how should we think of him: hero or heretic, rebel or tormented soul? Martin Luther is so interesting to study, Professor Phillip Cary believes, because he is so controversial. In fact, Luther may be more interesting to study today because the controversy surrounding him is more complicated—less black-and-white—than when he was alive.

# What's Different About this Course on Luther:

This course is not intended to leave you with a neutral impression of Luther. Professor Cary presents Luther as a multifaceted human being, a man with extraordinary virtues and profound flaws. You will meet an inspiring religious thinker who presented the Christian Gospel as a message of comfort, joy, and freedom; as great good news for sinners and God's loving promise of salvation. And you will encounter a leader whose unswerving certainty about his doctrines led him to launch vicious attacks against those with whom he disagreed most infamously and malevolently—the Jews.

Instead of defining Christ by our experiences (which is enough to make any sensible person anxious) we will define our lives by looking at what the Gospel tells us about Christ. So that on Christmas Day we can come to Bethlehem and find a tender maiden with a baby on her lap and say, "Mother, this baby is mine also." Or as Thomas puts it when he places his hands on the wounds of Jesus. "My Lord, and my God".

#### Social Justice Reading Group: Sabbath as Resistance, Saying No to the Culture of Now

Thursday, August 9th ~ 7pm

The Social Justice Reading Group is starting a new book: Sabbath as Resistance, Saying No to the Culture of Now by Walter Brueggemann. About the Sabbath as Resistance:

Discussions about the Sabbath often center around moralistic laws and arguments over whether a person should be able to play cards or purchase liquor on Sundays. In this volume, popular author Walter Brueggemann writes that the Sabbath is not simply about keeping rules but rather about becoming a whole person and restoring a whole society. Importantly, Brueggemann speaks to a 24/7 society of consumption, a society in which we live to achieve, accomplish, perform, and possess. We want more, own more, use more, eat more, and drink more. Keeping the Sabbath allows us to break this restless cycle and focus on what is truly important: God, other people, all life. Brueggemann offers a transformative vision of the wholeness God intends, giving world-weary Christians a glimpse of a more fulfilling and simpler life through Sabbath observance.


While you're always welcome to join in these discussion regardless of if you've attended in the past or regardless even if you've read the book, the start of a new book is always a nice time to jump in.

#### Reflections on Roadmap to Reconciliation

Social Justice Reading Group participants reflect on Roadmap to Reconciliation by Dr. Brenda Salter McNeil:

I stuck with this reading group because the discussions were lively and the topic of justice is a burden to me--mainly because I see so little of it. The book we read took justice further than just talking about it. Details of how to cause change were enlightening, but not easy, as we found out, to act upon. The Road to Reconciliation challenged us to make decisions to either stay safe and keep things the same and hope for the best, or come to understand that as a church, staying safe is very risky. Should we be a little bolder in living out God's love? Can we made headway in understanding the roadblocks and crossing the barriers--barriers we make or society makes or even churches make? I don't know about you, but I am really at a loss as to effective ways to accomplish reconciliation. Whether we think it's a doable thing for us or not, we need to discuss it-and we did.

As for action--we aren't there yet. Do we even know what kind of reconciliation we want? Do we, as a church want to reconcile anything? Our main emphasis in the group was to think about justice for the black community. To be reconciled to God in Christ is, of course, our first mission and I think we all agree on that. Harder by far to touch on certain opinions with which we disagree. For a personal note, I want agreement to at least fear for the loss of our country to a dictator. For me, all the signs are there. I think about the silent Lutherans in Germany. We're not ready though, are we? We call it politics and that's a dirty word in the church, and rightly so, but what about morality, lies, cruelty, prejudice, hatred? Isn't that a God issue? Thanks Cara and Katlin for giving us this opportunity. I'm looking forward to the next book. -Carolyn Swason



I began participating in this reading group late. There had been many things interfering with getting there, as there always are in our busy lives. What I enjoyed about the group was the laid back yet thought provoking discussions we had. The book was theoretical and was tying theory to action. The question often asked by group members, was what are we doing as a group and as a congregation to inspire social justice. I'm not sure we had definitive answers but it was a starting point. – Pamela Altman

For me, the social justice reading group isn't so much about the book than it is about the people and conversations. I'm one that didn't always get time to read the chapter before each meeting, but the group helped me understand and I was always included in the conversation. The topics covered in Roadmap to Reconciliation are important for the times we're living in, but difficult to live out. Although we don't come to a plan of action during the group discussion, it's nice to know that others are wrestling with the same issues.

I am so grateful to everyone who has participated in the Reading Group the last few months. I am inspired by Dr. Brenda Salter McNeil's words about the process of overcoming injustices that occur along racial and ethnicity lines and moving towards reconciliation (a word she does not use lightly). I am also moved by the vulnerable reflections shared by my fellow reading group participants the past few months. We shared ways that we are personally touched and moved by Dr. McNeil's book and ways it will impact us as we move forward. Mostly all throughout Dr. McNeil's book and our reading group discussions I was personally reminded of the ways God loves each of us equally - we humans were all made in God's image after all – and the work of reconciliation and justice is life-long. -Cara Kiggins

#### Where Does Our Giving Go? You Decide!

#### **BACKGROUND:**

Our Redeemer's tithes 10% of all unrestricted giving by giving 3% to organizations and efforts supporting social justice in our local and global community (Benevolence Funds), and 7% to the Northwest Washington Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America (ELCA). Of the seven percent (7%) given to the Northwest Washington Synod of the ELCA, some of it is used for ministries within the Synod, and much of it is given to the ELCA national organization for ministries around the world.

Three percent (3%) of all unrestricted giving to Our Redeemer's is given back (Benevolence Funds) to organizations and efforts supporting social justice in our local and global community.

Benevolence Recipient Submission Forms are distributed via email to the Social Justice Meeting participants at least two weeks before the next meeting (please see both the forms and the next meeting date posted on the bulletin board). After a quick question and answer at the Social Justice meeting, recipients are decided on by a paper vote and any members present may vote.



#### Purchase School Kit Supplies for Lutheran World Relief!

Education is one of the strongest tools a community has for breaking the cycle of poverty. Ensuring that girls attend school, especially in places where access is deprioritized, has even stronger results. School Kits contain the essential supplies to help children – and in some cases, adults – continue learning in the face of serious obstacles. That learning leads to a better life for them, their families and their communities. As back to school sales start popping up in stores over the summer, take advantage and purchase the following needed items for school kits. We can only make as many kits as the least number of items we have – so purchase many!

- Notebooks 70 sheets (280-300 sheets total) of wide or college ruled paper approximately 8" x 10.5", no loose leaf paper
- 30 centimeter rulers, or ruler with centimeters on one side and inches on the other
- Pencil sharpeners
- Blunt scissors (safety scissors with embedded steel blades work well)
- Unsharpened #2 pencils with erasers
- Black or blue ballpoint pens (no gel ink)
- Boxes of 16 or 24 crayons
- 2 ½" erasers




#### Road2Housing Is Up and Running!


