FROM THE PASTOR...



Here are some responses to my recent sermon called, “Jesus Repents”, which spoke to the need, as followers of Jesus, to repent of our own distancing from the racism in our nation and ourselves, and commit ourselves to listen, learn and act with people of color.

“You should have condemned Trump outright. Spell out how he is leading the U.S. toward a fascist state.”

“You weren’t empathetic enough. Condemning incidents in Moses Lake, Charlottesville and the U.S. is a judgment on people who are mistreated themselves. How is that loving?”

“I was overwhelmed by all that is going on. I couldn’t listen to it all.”

“Good sermon.” This from a few folks who don’t often commend my preaching. :-)

And some faces just clouded over -- whether because you came to church for a lift of your spirit, not to confront a painful reality, or because you just don’t think there’s any place in church for “politics”, or because it was all just very heavy.

Your varied responses prompt me to share a bit about how I think about my call as a pastor of Word and Sacrament and our shared call to be a beacon of God’s hope, love, justice and courage within our community.

I hope to encourage dialogue, not end it. And I say “dialogue” meaning conversation that is safe, respectful, open to learning from one another and seeing more of the picture AND more of God’s presence than we can as individuals. This is a strength of our congregation, and one our country desperately needs right now.

We can’t separate politics from the gospel. The gospel always has political implications because God cares about the world God created, and the physical needs and justice of the humans God created. Politics affect humans, so as God’s people our faith has political ramifications. Both the history of God’s people from the beginning and Jesus’ own death bear that out.

So, let us disagree on HOW God’s purposes should be implemented politically, but agree there is no room to say the church should keep our hands off political realities.



Saying “Love your enemies” doesn’t mean we should never condemn naming actions and speech as destructive or evil. Again, there is a LONG history of God’s people both speaking out AND God’s prophets calling God’s people out because they are failing to speak out and act. Speaking out for justice is not a zero sum game. It doesn’t devalue those intentionally or unintentionally hurting and devaluing others. To honor one person is not to dishonor another. There is enough grace, justice and love for all.

However, we never speak out from a position of superiority, but with acute awareness of our own real sin and the parts of us that have led us to be unkind or unjust, whether consciously or unconsciously.

We are called -- each of us as individuals and all of us as a congregation -- to offer our best gifts to be God’s instruments in the realities arising in our time and place. No one way of doing this is going to work for all of us, but all of us are needed to speak and act with our marginalized neighbors.

We MUST stay rooted and grounded in God’s grace as we do this in our tense times. As St. Paul says, we must “speak the truth in love,” not “return evil for evil.” This is demanding work, possible only with the aid of God’s Spirit.

In 2003-2004 we had an in-depth conversation as a congregation about becoming a Reconciling in Christ congregation, explicitly welcoming all LGBTQ folks, and, actually, ALL people. We prayed, listened, talked, disagreed and then did it some more. The result? We never all agreed, but we understood one another and really sought God’s will.

As opportunities present themselves in the months ahead, I hope Our Redeemer’s will dare to engage with that same depth and care around our white privilege, and our differing understanding of what is needed.

I believe this isn’t just important, but essential. It is the work of the Holy Spirit around and within us. For God’s Spirit disturbs as well as comforts; speaks truth right alongside peace; and, through it all, holds us fast in a love which nothing can separate us from and a hope which nothing can destroy.

BUILD THE VISION... SHARE THE VISION!

VISION-ALIGNED BUILDING UPDATE



With renovation work completed in the Fellowship Hall, the Vision-Aligned Building (VAB) Team now turns its eyes toward the next phases of our generational facilities project. As reported in the last edition of *The Visitor*, requests for proposals (RFPs) went out to five different design-build contractor firms that were recommended by VAB Team members in early summer.

While several of the firms originally contacted expressed some interest in the project, unfortunately, only one completed an RFP. The others indicated that they would not have the ability to add us to their schedules in the midst of the amazing construction climate we currently find ourselves in in the Seattle area.

Subsequently, VAB Team members Mike Hlastala and Don Boelter reached out to colleagues for additional recommendations, and contacted about ten additional recommended firms. Most reported that they also were too busy to take on a project of this scope at this time, but two did express interest in completing an RFP. Both were sent RFPs and concept design plans, and as of the date of this article, we are waiting to hear back from them.

The VAB Team will review completed RFPs as soon as possible and we hope to start work with the contractors in early Fall 2017. If all goes well with the permitting process, etc., we hope to begin work on the sanctuary, offices, and narthex/entry areas in the summer of 2018.

Before moving forward with the next phase, per church policies and council instructions, the congregation will have the opportunity to vote on expending Capital Campaign and Legacy funds and/or taking out a building loan. Additional opportunities to learn more about what's ahead with the project, and future forums to ask questions and express concerns are also being planned. In the meantime, we will continue to provide monthly VAB updates in *The Visitor*, and will publicize future Congregational Meetings in all our usual communications avenues.

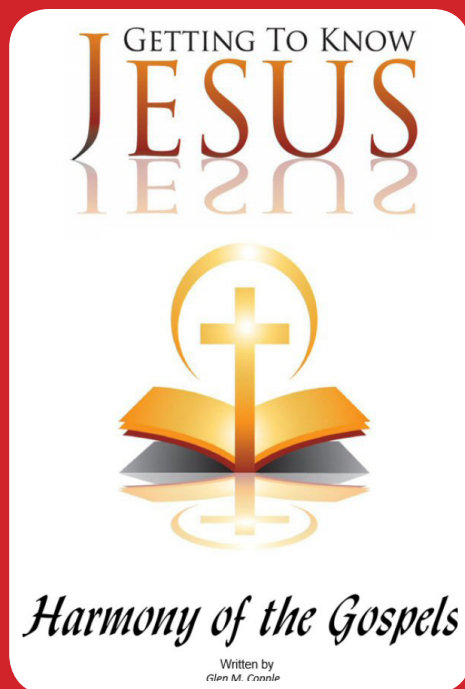

Wednesday Morning Bible Study: “Jesus and the Gospels”

🕒 BEGINS SEPTEMBER 13, 2017 @ 10:30AM

Wednesday’s Bible Study (September 13 at 10:30 a.m. in the library) is soon upon us. I so want you to try it out to see if it could be meaningful for you. There is no doubt its relevancy. Knowing the Christ in all His glory and wisdom and suffering is so worthwhile to each of us in these days. Think of Scripture as “God-Breathed”. I think we would all agree we need a message from Jesus, the Christ.

So this study, “Jesus and the Gospels” reveals our Savior in new and enlightening ways. The following is from the study’s cover page:

For most of the last 2,000 years, questions about the figure of Jesus have begun with the Gospels, but the

Gospels themselves raise puzzling questions about both Jesus and the religious movement within which these narratives were produced. Is it possible to shape a single picture from the various accounts of his life given us by these Gospels? This far-ranging course examines not only the canonical Gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John familiar to us from the New Testament, but also the many other, apocryphal narratives and literary works that have contributed to our perceptions of Jesus, Mary, and Christianity – all of which are encompassed by the word “Gospel.” In these 36 engaging lectures, you’ll discover the human Jesus that underlies many portraits we have.

After introducing you to the era’s volatile mixture of Mediterranean culture, Greek ideals and realities, Roman governance, and the religion of Israel, Professor Johnson turns to the Gospels and provides close analyses of key lines of text, explanations of the significance of language and terminology, and overviews of important issues with which scholars have long grappled. You’ll learn about the different issues of faith each Gospel emphasizes, as well as the real-world logistics of spreading that faith during the early Christian era. But it is the figure addressed by the Gospels who dominates these lectures, sometimes in ways less familiar than the portrayals of Jesus we most often encounter. Beyond the portrayal in the synoptic gospels, you’ll study what the apocryphal narratives say about the childhood of Jesus. Among other things, you’ll also learn about the source of Roman Catholicism’s doctrine of Mary and examine the 2nd century faith of Gnosticism.

It will be so much more meaningful with you there. Please consider it. This is not a woman’s study; it is for all genders!

There will be more to the process if you continue to be curious and/or feel ready to explore joining (not a requirement at all), but this first gathering will be an introduction to the pastors, to other folks new to Our Redeemer’s and to what “The Journey” is. Make the substantial hors d'oeuvres your supper, and take advantage of the child care.

By night, Peter's Place opens its doors as an overnight shelter for 8 women and 38 men, creating a location for round-the-clock services for homeless men and women in Seattle.

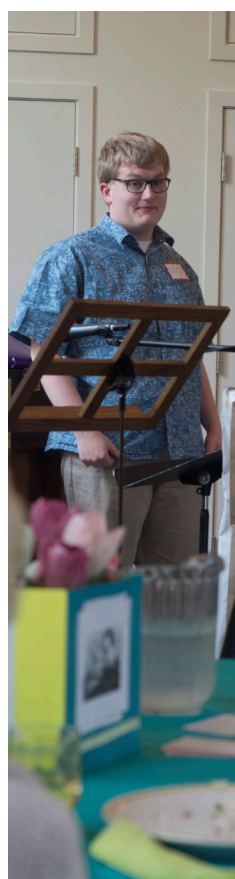

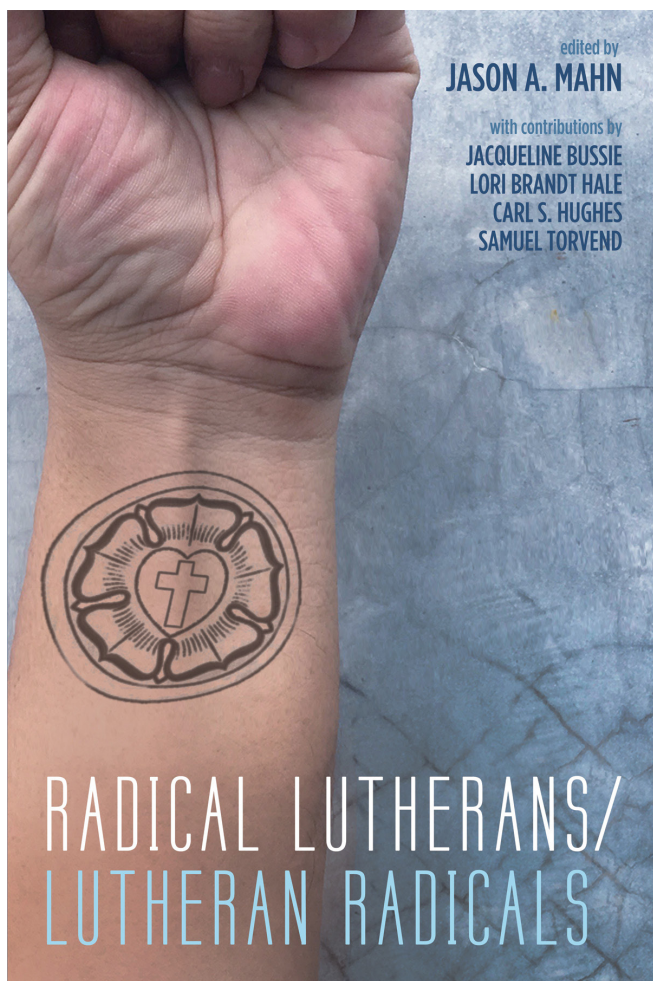

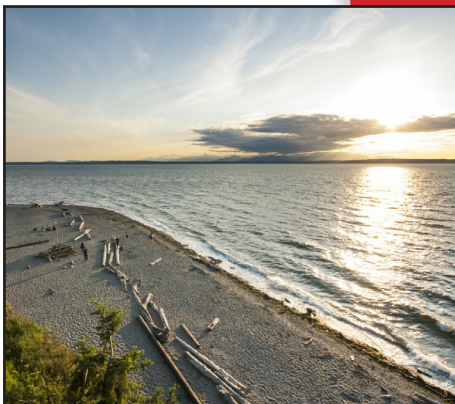
