

From the Pastor...

Out of the Wilderness

Previously in this section, I wrote, "the wildness of God's grace widens the eye and allows us to see how little control we exert in this life without consequences." As we come closer to Holy Week—as we continue to walk deeper into the wilderness—what is revealed is the complexity of life, and the limits of our condition in sin.

Wilderness can become a garden when boundaries are drawn around it. A jungle can only reach as far as it can hold its biosphere, a desert eventually reaches water, and a valley is hemmed in by hills and mountains. So too, can we see the earth as a patchwork of gardens if we understand the nature of the places into which we enter. Knowing how these gardens grow and are sustained helps us to live according to their environment. And then, wilderness seems less wild, but more natural. We become less wanderers, but explorers. In this way, the old adage is true: "not all who wander are lost."

God's people were never truly lost, though it may have felt that way at times, and the guidance God gave often was lost on them. They lived in contrast to the settled life they had, rather, to be given a balcony view-to view themselves and how God might see them, and learn the folly and futility of the search to control, tame, and shape life according to our desires. A gardener who does not understand the life living within it cannot tend it well. So too, we do not set the boundaries between wilderness and garden, we do not create the road out of the wilderness, as if by constructing our own path or following our own ways-or even looking to our own survival—are we saved, healed, and restored to our place within creation. Those boundaries assure us of life. as well.

Instead the pace of Lent, and the road through Holy Week turn us from aimless wandering and set the pace of life as it truly is; we live between the boundaries of cross and death and resurrection to eternal life. We walk in a valley of death, and yet also a garden of life.

It is the purpose of our Christian pilgrimage—to have the structures and fabrics of this life rearranged according to God's life in, through, and among us. The cross is the signpost along the way, and not the end and thankfully, not our end with God. But walking the way of the cross is walking also towards the garden. Our human folly is revealed if we believe ourselves to be in the garden and not on the road, though. "The message of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing" St. Paul writes in First Corinthians, "but to us who are being saved it is the power of God." The cross reveals our own limits and boundaries of knowledge to care and sustain this creation—we are not God. But from that cross-walk, we cross over to a new road; we await resurrection, renewal, and transformation in the Body of Christ.

It is not often that we experience life as a walk through a garden, as the idiom goes. We don't experience life as often with ease, but as work. Ask any gardener, however, and they'll remind us just how much daily work it takes to maintain the boundaries and health and growth even of the soil itself. Such is the road that took God's people



home from their exile and wandering—the work that transformed them, to tend the garden as we were intended. To be part of this world, not creators of our own worlds. And, God leads us on this road, out of our wandering and out of the wilderness.

We had a community Christmas tree to decorate this year, why not a community cross, too? Taking down our Christmas tree this year, we thought about the image of Christ and the glory of Christmas, counterposed with the humility and starkness of Good Friday—the glory and worship of the newborn king, and the messiah who is crowned with thorns. We are turning our Christmas trees into a cross we will use during the Good Friday service, placed in the sanctuary in the same spot it stood throughout December. 24-Hour Prayer Vigil and Prayers

Jesus asked his disciples to watch and wait with him before his crucifixion. In Luke's gospel, we are told that those who had followed him to Jerusalem watched his crucifixion and death in silence. We are told that around noon on the day of his death, darkness came over the land. As in Advent, the darkness evokes our watching for the sunlight of the new day on the eastern horizon, and the great expectation for God's glory to shine on the awaited day of hope and transformation. Our 24-vigil is a tradition of keeping watch, vigilance, lament, hope, and prayer. It is a time of candle-lighting, reflection, meditation, silence and song. This year, we will continue our tradition to keep watch in 1-hour shifts, from noon on Good Friday to noon on Holy Saturday. Please sign up to keep watch this year in this meaningful and heart-felt tradition. Sign up sheets will be available beginning March 30. Door codes will be emailed with further instructions for the safety and care of the building. Contact Pastor Thomas for more information.

We will be collecting and organizing prayers to be prayed by those signing up to keep watch during the vigil, starting March 30 through Wednesday of Holy Week. Holy Week at Our Redeemer's

Holy Week this year will continue to be framed by our Lenten theme, "God's People are Formed in Wilderness." As we walk the road to the Christ's cross, we are met on the way by a God who gives us strength for the journey, and assures we do not walk alone. As we await the day of resurrection, we live in the joy and in the image of Christ, as his Body in the world.

April 13: Palm Sunday

Beginning outside the sanctuary with joyful palms raised and acclamations, we will process in, moved by Christ's coming as God's holy messiah. We celebrate this high point in light of his following crucifixion and death, and follow this humble king within his disciples from joy and elation, to sorrow and bewilderment. April 17: Maundy Thursday - 6 PM

The liturgy starts with foot-washing, followed by communion and the stripping of the altar. This is an interactive service remembering the last supper of Jesus and his disciples before his crucifixion.

April 18: Good Friday

3:00 pm – Join us in person or online for this special marking of the death of Jesus and a meditation on the cross, through prayers and chants of the church. In this moment of prayer and lament, we mark the time when Jesus breathed his last. **7:00 pm** – Our service of on the crucifixion of Christ reflects on the tradition of Tenebrae (Shadows). In this service of darkness and candlelight, we keep watch and hear of his passion and death through Scripture, silence, and singing. This moving service is a special and well-loved tradition at Our Redeemer's.

April 18-19: Good Friday - 24-hour Prayer Vigil

Beginning at noon on Good Friday, and continuing until noon on Holy Saturday, we invite individuals to sign up to pray for an hour, keeping watch at the church. The sanctuary and chapel will be set up for meditation and some materials for meditation and the prayers of our congregation will be provided. Faith Formation: Hope, Love, and Justice

This is the third in a series I was asked to share examining our leadership's vision and approach to Faith Formation and Justice for Our Redeemer's. Last time, I examined some frameworks within our Lutheran beliefs that help ground ourselves for putting faith into action. Grace and faith are the mainstay of our life in Christ; God accomplishes justice then, by trusting God to transform us and work through us. This time, I explore the importance of hope, and the activeness of love.

Already this year, we have heard about love in the Scriptures. Jesus speaks to how we are to love our enemies. Since this is the year of Luke in our lectionary cycle, it is only fitting that we notice the parable of the Good Samaritan. Trusting that even one of those we might call an "enemy" could do good, that God could use them for good work is the fulcrum

for turning the minds and hearts of those who hear this parable. Jesus is asked about the greatest commandment, and gives two, love God and love your neighbor as you love yourself. But Jesus takes the form of neighbor and affirms what he said in the Sermon on the Mount; "If you love those who love you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners love those who love them." (Note it is strongly implied that sinners may be general here to give the sense to listeners might instinctively think of those in opposition to them as living unjustly. It is essentially to draw us out of ourselves so that we might see in our "enemies" a mirror to our own attitudes.) All this is to say the love of enemies—a command—is not just work, it is the work of love itself.

Love is relationship in scripture—it is obligation, even by covenant. For example, marriage is a covenant relationship between people and their families—so marriage is powered by love. Love is not romantic or has the feels attached to it. Jesus is speaking to a community that is expansive—God's reconciliation of all things in Christ recreates a "kin—dom," in which all things are hemmed in by the wide embrace of God. God's love for the world, just as our love for one another, is a sacred obligation. Further, it is obligation to care, to serve, to be merciful. We don't do this perfectly. We do this, as Jesus implies, in limited ways or we confine love to family or friends. But we don't just live here—we have life together here. So by seeing that enemies are to be loved, restores the original good—relationships established by God. Love is action. It is not a feeling, although feeling strongly connected to someone as one would a friend or close family member, means that we might enact that love in care and service more willingly. Further, love is right—relationship with God and other creatures. Thus, "who is my neighbor?" has such an expansive answer in the parable of the Good Samaritan.

We believe also that, like faith, love is a gift of the Spirit. It reveals the reality of this world: we are all interconnected and our actions affect the whole. Who we choose to care for has not only implications, but impact on the world. Who we believe God is working through—or could work through!—impacts our love for them. Our desire to care, our willingness to help and support, our sense of life lived together is a matter of right-relationship, which God gives through love for, to, in, and through creation. Love as a gift is the gift of life together. A worldwide community.

Primarily, the church has taught us by John's Gospel "love one another" as a general command to love others we may even despise or oppose. Still, the Gospel of John is written for a generally insular community—one being persecuted and on the outs with Jewish and Roman authorities. The command to love one another in this context can be not to love one's enemies, but to stay true to the body of Christ. "By this, they will know you are my disciples." But overall, we take a different approach.


In justice work, the work of love is a realization of our impact and capacity to harm. It is also a realization that we will not be perfect in anything we may do—even in love. For Christians, this becomes even more emphasized, and our humility means our openness and trust that God can work such good in the world, and that it is not only God's desire, but God's will done through reconciliation. Right-relationship is the work of justice in the gift of love. But imagining how we might work for the mutual benefit and good of all, how we might dismantle the unjust structures that keep us from living into this inter-relational work that is God's creation, takes some inspiration. It takes trust that God is working, even in the places and people we don't expect.

Hope is imagination. Hope is a belief—a trust that God is working. Hope is a trust that things not only can and will change, but are being changed, and fully changeable. Faith-in-action may be love, but it begins with the holy imagining of God—a vision for a new world—a world as it is meant to be.


