
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The community art project "Ribbons of Hope" fence will be up until summer, so if and when you're so moved, add your ribbon or message of hope on the construction fence at the church!

Community Engagement – what does this mean?

Have you started wondering and dreaming about the potential for our newly remodeled building? What's it going to be like for worship? For education? For special events? I sure hope you have.

I have been envisioning all kinds of amazing ways of being church together in the space. Probably, the pandemic has made me fantasize about it even more than I otherwise would have! Imagine this...

- Hosting musical events that are open to the neighborhood and inspire us to dream. Not only that, but they are well-lit and well-heard!
- Inviting the neighborhood to a worship service that includes a full meal and a food pantry where people can sing and pray and eat and get groceries if they need them.
- Premiering a new documentary about saving Washington's waterways and inviting folks from NOAA and National Geographic and around the country to participate.
- Curating a songwriter's workshop for local church musicians culminating in liturgical art that can be used throughout the world!

As we dream about how God's gift of the amazing asset of our new fully-functional, open, bright, beautiful space can be best used, it is clear that intentionality and open conversation are going to be imperative.

As a congregation, we inherently hope to change for the better the lives of those who rub shoulders with us. If we are wise, we also pray that God will change us through those relationships, too – even when that seems intimidating or uncertain in outcome.

We are in an enduring time of growth and hope in our congregation, even while our country is in an ongoing time of crisis. We are blessed to be doing God's will because we trust in God's abundance, and refuse to give in to the lie that we are in a time of scarcity.

Our LENTEN THEME:

LORD, TEACH US TO PRAY

Prayer – in some ways so simple and direct. As in Anne LaMotte's book Help! Thanks! Wow! At other times, prayer is deeper than words. And then, there are the times we don't even know how to start or may wonder if God is listening.

We aren't alone! Jesus' disciples also felt at a bit of a loss when it came to prayer...Which is why they asked him, "Lord, teach us to pray." [Luke 11:1]

His response was the prayer we call The Lord's Prayer or the Our Father. As often as we pray it, we can continue to learn from it and be shaped by it, along with connecting to God through it.

At the end of 2020, the US Supreme Court made a ruling in a case about the closure of a church during the pandemic. Centering Prayer

When it Works for You

Silence can be one of the most healing realities there is. When we're not used to it, we may feel awkward or uncomfortable, but even so, the quiet of a night without jets in the sky or Netflix in the background is often just what our souls need.

Every Wednesday, the gift of 30 minutes of quiet prayer is yours.

If you can't "live Zoom" at that time, look for it on Our Redeemer's Facebook page, as it will be recorded there for viewing later so you can pray at any time that works for you.

Danielle Modeen, who has decades of experience in both Buddhist meditation and Centering Prayer, leads us with 10 minutes of quiet music or chant, followed by 20 minutes of silence, and then a 2-3 minute reading. Those who come to prayer remain quiet the whole time.

Simple guidelines for Centering Prayer will always be available on Zoom chat. But this is not a way of praying just for specially-gifted people. It is simply for anyone who feels drawn to it, and wants to be more open to God.

WHY do we do this? Nadia Bolz-Weber says: "Ash Wednesday is my favorite day of the church year and Lent is my favorite season. Our culture has no idea what to do with this day. But to me, there is actually great hope is admitting my mortality and brokenness because then I finally lay aside my sin management program and allow God to be God for me. Which is all any of us really need when it comes right down to it." Join us.

A Lenten Devotional - Created by You!

Calling all Children of God! If you're a big reader, a photographer, an artist, a writer, or a thinker - we would love for you to participate in our Lenten devotional!

For Lent this year, we are hoping to engage the congregation around one word each week, from all different angles. Tying together with Dana Wright's class on the Lord's Prayer that is being offered, we have pulled six focus words from the Lord's Prayer: Holy, (God's) Will, Bread, Forgive, Temptation, and (God's) Kingdom. Each day of Lent, our folks will receive a devotional email reflection on that word. You are invited to sign up for a "word" for one day, which will include a reflection piece.

Reflection pieces can be anything that resonates for you - artwork, a song or hymn, a favorite Bible story or parable, a passage from a book, a poem, or a part of nature.

For example, take the word "Bread." It may inspire you to share the song "Come Let Us Eat" from the hymnal. So, you would sign up for a day with that word and indicate that you will share a reflection on the song. Then, write a brief paragraph or story, explaining how you connect the word from the Lord's Prayer with the reflection piece you have chosen.



You are not limited by the categories given – for example, if a person wanted to talk about how a certain plant gives them insight about the Kingdom of God, that would be amazing. Or if someone had a favorite poem that talked about forgiveness, that would be brilliant. It's really up to you!

What Happened Last Month: Renovation Update

Chancel Floor Framed

1/15/2021: Mechanical and electrical rough-in is underway on the upper level. The framing of the Chancel floor is nearly complete with one section at the Chapel remaining. This small area is anchored into the masonry walls and will be done and inspected with other masonry work in the Sanctuary.



The VAB team has worked with the architect on the design solution for the Chapel. As mentioned in earlier updates, the Chancel and Chapel floors will be on the same level to facilitate access for all. In addition, the "forest" of reclaimed pew wood will be backed by opaque glass walls and a door that will allow both visual and audible isolation between the two spaces, while still bringing in light to the Chapel and connecting it to the Sanctuary. The architect's rendering above is from the perspective of standing on the Chancel looking south at the Chapel with the ramp to the right or west.

The lower level of the building is also making good progress. All concrete walls have been poured and forms stripped, the ramp is in place with two classroom doors relocated, and the infill at the south stair is complete. Framing and plumbing rough-in is also complete with inspections occurring this week.

Charges against the Construction Contingency to date include:

- Lowering the Chapel floor to bring it to the same level as the Chancel and provide full ADA access.
- Providing a portable toilet with hand-washing facilities for the Road to Housing clients for the duration of construction.
- Providing internet access to the site during construction due to removal required for service at new Ballard temporary finance office.
- Added framing and footing due to hidden conditions in framing at Narthex/Restroom area.
- Replace electrical conduit and wire that were in the Chancel floor framing.
- Chancel floor framing changes to due as-built condition.
- Replace insulation in Administration area ceiling that was damaged by removal of asbestos popcorn ceilings.
- Add foundation and concrete costs due to lower-level concrete walls at south addition.
- Modification to Fellowship Hall Operable Wall to hang from beam vs. ceiling.
- Credit of \$400 for changing lower-level storefront and door to aluminum and adding electric strike.
- Revise Chapel north wall design.
- Raise hydronic pipes in basement to eliminate damage potential.

Where have we been:

- Since September 2020 we have been in the Old Testament (or Hebrew Scriptures
 or Tanakh) during the years of the Babylonian Exile of the Southern Kingdom
 (tribes of Judah and Benjamin) That exile started with a two-stage deportation 597 and 587 BCE and presumably ended with the conquest of Babylon by the
 Persian king Cyrus the Great in 538 BCE.
- 2. Restoration of the Judean Kingdom not an easy task
- 3. Inter-Testament years about 400 of them With the Old Testament canon closing with Malachi at about 397 B.C., we see that this period between Malachi and Matthew covers some four hundred years. This four-hundred-year interval has been called "the dark period" of Israel's history in pre-Christian times, because during it there was neither prophet nor inspired writer. With this period, we seem to find the sad fulfillment of Psalm 74:9 upon Israel: "We see not our signs; there is no more any prophet; neither is there among us any that knows how long."



It is exciting! We are crossing over to the New Testament to the Book of 1st Thessalonians, supposedly, depending on whom you check, the first of St. Paul's letters to the churches where he ministered. Date estimated at 48 CE. We will be connecting dots between Old and New and learning about the young churches who would be the root of Christianity in the years a ter the death and resurrection of Jesus. And, to our point, how are we doing in being little Christs, as Luther puts it?

Why are you invited? Or Why give it a try? The Word of God is a very important part of staying close to your faith and your God. Sunday morning sermons are vital, as are other studies on Sundays before worship services (9:30 AM). I heartily recommend them! The difference is a whole hour + of looking into Scripture. We begin with prayer and then the learning. There are surprises to be found, comfort to be felt, challenges to be met, opportunities to question and comment (if you want to). And not to be considered least, I think you will like us. We could become some more people to fellowship with during this COVID-19 separation. Pray about it. All are welcome! Lord, Teach Us To Pray: Adult Forums in Lent

He has taught in congregations and seminaries in the United States and India and written essays on Christian Education in books and periodicals especially focused on the work of the Holy Spirit in human thought and experience in the thought of James Loder. At Our Redeemer's, he helps teach the Sprouts class and serves on the Faith Formation and Generosity Teams.



Teach Us to Pray - Based on the Lord's Prayer, Matt. 6:9-13

The church knows the Lord's Prayer in Matthew's Gospel as a staple of liturgical devotion. But the prayer should also be known as "the Disciples' Prayer." Jesus does not teach his followers a formal prayer for use in the temple or synagogue so much as a prayer of survival on the streets. Jesus' concern is to teach the disciples to depend upon the Father for living obediently (i.e., righteously) to the call of radical discipleship in the world. In such a world disciples will be assailed on all sides and tempted to compromise their convictions and distort their witness to the Reign of God. The Disciples Prayer does not take the disciples out of the world but follows the "downward" movement of Christ's Incarnation where Immanuel, "God with us," takes hold to reorient us and equip us to represent Christ in a lost and needy world. We might even say that all true prayer, based on the Disciples' Prayer, follows this downward, incarnational pattern.

February 22: "Our Father Who Art in Heaven, Hallowed Be Thy Name." Jesus begins his instructive prayer by orienting the disciples to the creative origin of all life and blessedness, the Father in heaven. "Our Father" denotes community and intimacy. The Father does not have to be cajoled to give grace and mercy. But this intimate connection does not overshadow the fact that the Father is holy. God is our Father but not our buddy. Our source of existence is the transcendent but intimate Father.

March 1: "Thy Kingdom Come, Thy Will Be Done, on Earth as It Is in Heaven." The disciples are to prayer for God's heavenly authority and power to come to earth. Implied here is that the disciples are invested in God's reign making itself known in the world. Disciples know that the last, best, and only hope for the world is the coming and present reign of God. The verbs are imperative and passionate: "Bring your kingdom." "Make your will active and sure among us."

March 8: "Give Us This Day Our Daily Bread." Moving downward to the very nitty gritty of human existence, the prayer recognizes God as the source of earthly, embodied, existence. The Father's reign is not so holy that the common concerns of daily human existence are not central to God's concerns. Disciples recognize that God is a materialist and a humanist in their daily prayers.

March 15: "Forgive Us Our Debts as We Forgive Our Debtors." The prayer of the disciples goes further down into the recesses of human existence. Human beings cannot live by bread alone but by the Word of God taking root deeply within our spirits where ongoing forgiveness is essential. But the wording here may also indicate economic well-being. Disciples do well not to over spiritualize the prayer that Jesus taught them. The reconciliation and justice we extend to others through forgiveness debts may be a central feature of the prayer that we ignore to our peril.

March 22: "Lead Us Not into Temptation but Deliver Us from Evil." The prayer moves down deeper into the place where the issues of life come up again and again. The prayer recognizes our tendencies toward waywardness, both our tendencies to place ourselves in tempting circumstances and our tendencies to get ourselves mixed up into the most egregious and dehumanizing attitudes and actions. All of our actions come from the heart, and in the disciples prayer we pray for God's strength to maintain purity of heart.

March 29: "For Thine is the Kingdom, the Power and the Glory Forever, Amen." This phrase was probably added to the prayer to make it suitable to formal worship. But we might also understand this phrase in light of Irenaeus' wonderful phrase: The glory of God is humanity fully alive." Downward movement after the pattern of Christ, who thought it not equality with God something to be grasped, resulted in glorification.

HARDSHIP AND HOPE by Tamara Anderson

An incidental, yet delightful, soul satisfying, properly socially distanced, and in-person interaction with Pastor Kathy Hawks recently led to an invitation to share a thought and experience.

When asked how she was, Kathy, literally, had no words. Her arms in the air and an almost silent sigh said it all. It is hard. This pandemic is hard. It is really, really hard. Life, as we all know pandemic is hard upside down, sideways, and inside out. It it, has been turned upside down, sideways, and inside out.



has elongated and constricted. People have died. She mentioned she turns to those who have lived through The Depression as one way to understand and persevere. I flippantly, and in all humble seriousness, replied, I turn to myself. She paused but a moment before realizing exactly what I meant.

Amidst much of life's lovelinesses, I, like many, have also been thrown some hard stuff.

and held me in it all. While awful
and I never wish hardship of any kind upon anyone at any time, ever, I have to say there are
some positive takeaways. And, these takeaways, thankfully, have allowed me to enter into,
and be with this current, more collective, hardship in a way that I know is likely different.
Stronger.

I read an article in Psychology Today recently that spoke of "existential courage," a term that caught my attention. Basically, it is a decision. Every human can make it. Rather than wondering why bad things happen to good people, we re-frame: what can good people do when bad things happen? I experienced just that in my times of hardship. The good things when bad things happen? I experienced just that in my times of hardship. The good things people did for me sustained and carried me through; delivering me from evil, as it were.

The idea of existential courage is not asking oneself, "What did I do to deserve this?" Rather, it is crafting a meaningful response to misfortune. This, too, is Victor Frankl's thinking behind his theory of psychology, Logotherapy, shaped by his and all devastating experiences to The Holocaust. In addition to Frankl, Anne Frank and Laura Ingalls Wilder have related to The Holocaust. In addition to Frankl, Anne Frank and Laura Ingalls wilder have been some of my chosen and revisited authors through this pandemic. Like Kathy and her comment about The Depression, they give me additional perspective on hardship and hope. Perhaps sharing a little of my own experience, adds yet another perspective to your own bank of resources.

If there's one thing I know, it can get bad, really bad. And, even after it is bad, it can get what worse. And ... it can get better. Sometimes that takes time and not always our time. But what I am glad for more than anything else is you. And, I hope that you are glad for me. In my mid-twenties, driving north on the Ship Canal Bridge, I had an epiphany that has guided much of my life and career. It hit me that relationship was everything and without it, well, we are going to have a really hard time. That was my conviction, as a counseling graduate student at the time, to serve others to craft healthy relationships, with themselves and each other. With that I say, let us be attentive. Take care of one another. This is hard. And, it could get worse. It is going be OK. Craft a meaningful response. God is with you.




Social Justice Search Team Update


