

A Statement on Immigration

As Lutherans, we are called to live out the teachings of Jesus Christ, who welcomed strangers and emphasized love, mercy, and justice for all people. We believe that every human being, regardless of their country of origin or legal status, is created in the image of God and has inherent dignity and worth. This foundational truth compels us to approach the issue of immigration with compassion and a commitment to the common good.

Scripture repeatedly instructs us to love our neighbor and show the stranger hospitality. God commands the people of Israel, "The foreigner residing among you must be treated as your native-born. Love them as yourself" (Leviticus 19:34). Jesus' parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25-37) shows us that caring for people in need is central to who we are as Christians. The parable also challenges us to acknowledge the goodness in all people because the "foreigner" in the story is the one who acts in the most Christlike way. In light of these teachings, we advocate for an immigration policy that reflects Christ's love, recognizing that all people deserve respect and protection.

The Lutheran tradition emphasizes both mercy and justice. Justice requires everyone, including immigrants, to be treated fairly and equitably. While upholding the rule of law is important, it must not be done in ways that dehumanize or exploit vulnerable people. We are especially concerned about the possibility that places of worship, hospitals, and schools could be the target of deportation raids. A policy that allowed such raids would increase the suffering not only of undocumented people but also of many people who would fear being unjustly targeted and thus avoid those places. Denying people the opportunity to attend worship, be educated, or receive medical treatment violates individuals' fundamental rights. We urge those in government and law enforcement who are responsible for the detention or deportation of undocumented persons to consider how their actions might be seen in the eyes of God.

We are all members of the same human family. Therefore, we approach immigration not merely as a political or legal issue but as a matter of human solidarity. The health and prosperity of the United States are intertwined with the contributions and lives of immigrants. Immigrants bring diverse gifts and play an essential role in our communities and economies. Our immigration policies should reflect a commitment to the welfare of all, especially the most vulnerable.

As people who have received God's mercy and grace, we are called to extend that same mercy and grace to others. This means offering opportunities for new beginnings, particularly for those already present in the United States without legal documentation. A just immigration policy would provide pathways to citizenship for those who have lived in the U.S. for years, contributing to the country and integrating into our communities. It should also guarantee protection for those fleeing violence or persecution, ensure that immigrant families remain united, and make sure that children are not punished for their parents' actions.

We are called, as individuals and as a society, to remember that the immigrants among us are not intruders or enemies but bearers of the image of God, deserving of our care, respect, and advocacy.

<u>Income:</u> Our Redeemer's income, halfway through the fiscal year, is \$279,917. This is \$33,000 less than budgeted. Regular giving is \$20,000 less than budgeted for at this point in the fiscal year, however, it is slightly more than it was at this same time last year. The auction has yet to happen which skews the income to budget comparison.

<u>Expenses:</u> We have spent \$304,000 which is below budget by \$36,000. The greatest contributor to spending less than budgeted comes from the administration category, as we paused the hiring of the volunteer coordinator/admin assistant until income and expenses were more closely aligned.

<u>Overall:</u> We have spent \$26,000 more than we have brought in for the fiscal year. This does include \$47,000 in expenses for the water leak, all of which occurred at the beginning of the FY. The Auction will also increase our income, which will bring income even closer to alignment with expenses.

Join the Altar Task Force

Every week, we focus on God's table of forgiveness and mercy.

We meet God in bread and wine by sharing Scripture, offering peace, and presenting our gifts to support the ministry of Christ's church. We ask God to bless these offerings for service at God's table. We worship in a space shaped by the seasons and the Spirit, building our gatherings around the places where God's Word promises to be present: the place of reading and proclamation, the place of our entry into new life in Christ, and the place where we encounter God's presence in the sharing of holy food for the journey.

Throughout history, the church has carefully and meaningfully designed furnishings to teach and proclaim the gospel through the Word and Sacraments. I've seen paschal candle stands emblazoned with the fire of the Spirit, lamps shaped like lighthouses, a binnacle used as an ambo, and pulpits adorned with angels and saints praising God. Baptismal fonts take many

forms, from coffins to a dramatically parted Red Sea, with heavenly waters flowing into the river of life and out into the world. These pieces reflect a community's understanding of the gospel and their perspective on God's story for their time and place. Sometimes, functionality takes precedence over form.

As we complete the work of the Vision Aligned Building capital campaign (VAB) church renovation, we now seek meaningful and beautiful designs for an altar and, if possible, a font and lectern. **Council and the Liturgical Arts Team invite those interested to join a task force to find these designs.** Please email <u>Pastor Thomas</u> or <u>Marie Lutequist</u> by February 10 to join, so the council can confirm members. We raised funding for this purpose during the remodel campaign. Please prayerfully consider joining this ministry!

Share Your Lenten Daily Devotions

As we approach the Lenten season, we have a special opportunity to pause and devote time to reflect together. From Ash Wednesday through Holy Saturday (excluding Sundays in Lent) we invite you to share daily devotions. Scriptures will be selected from the lectionary to anchor and inspire writing and reflection.

Did you know Sundays during Lent don't count among the 40 days? That is why we call them Sundays in Lent, not Sundays of Lent. (That means, Sundays are fasting "cheat" days!) And, in our tradition the "triduum" (3 days), comprised of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday, are considered part of the 40 days of Lent.

Devotions will be sent out via email to those on our Devotions mailing list each evening, March 4 - April 18. Evening devotions look toward the following date.



We need your submissions about two weeks prior to release date. For example, for devotions for March 5 – 8, sign up and submit by February 19.

A devotions sign up sheet will be available on Sundays and during office hours, and sign ups online will be posted on Sign Up Genius. Please sign up for as many days as you feel stirred to contribute!

- February 9- Barbara Smith leads an all ages Embodied Church entitled, "What the Ocean and Outer Space Tell Us About God."



Faith Formation: A Foundation for Justice

This is the first in a series I was asked to share examining our leadership's vision and approach to Faith Formation and Justice for Our Redeemer's. - Pastor Thomas

After the events of the past few weeks, I cannot imagine a greater prompt for our community to address our growth than the renewed fervor in government to obliviate the personhood of so many by the stroke of a pen. In the face of injustice, we may feel stunned to silence, as were those who Luke's gospel describes as standing and watching the crucifixion of Jesus. The sense of powerlessness is deliberate—the wearying of people in the hopes of capitulation and apathy and the intimidation even in the name of Jesus is intentional. Yet, we rise daily to meet a God who speaks truth to power and builds community in spite of forces to divide and isolate. And for our church, God, who reconciles all things in Christ, grows and builds community as we come to reconcile the truth of our life together and the life of our world, in light of Jesus.



We believe God forms us by grace through faith. It is not our own achievements that can bring justice to this world, but only the God who returns and homes with us,

and in turn, turns us homeward bound. And this worldly home returned to God, is reconciled to God, where all are embraced and rejoiced over, as a child who was lost turns up and returns home. As a sheep that is returned to its flock.

Our Redeemer's sees beyond Christian education as classroom experience, rather it is Faith Formation. The ways we reflect on our mission, and our outreach, the ways we serve our call is formative; study is in activity and participation as much as it is being informed by reading and writing. Faith formation is our way of building our community and drawing on the unity of our call in baptism. It is our way of seeking redemption and justice. It is a way of embodying the reconciliation we have in Christ. We see it as grace-filled, and redemptive—we are spared from walking in darkness in light of the truth of our world and we are rescued from mindsets that trap us in habits of blame-laying and self-justifications.

We could feel lost at this time—whether it be a sense of lost identity, or discomfort in liminal and transitional space. We may feel lost for which direction and which priorities are calling us. But God finds us in community. Being a part of the community is not always comfortable. Transformation requires growth and growing pains are a sign of what is natural. **Faith formation** is our priority, because God's gift of faith forms community in Christ, and reveals God's justice.

We believe that by being "conformed by the renewing of (y)our minds" as Paul said is a way of life together.

A community has one life together, but many lives. It faces conflict and challenge in the course of interactions. It seeks resolution that is lasting and healing that is unifying. Further, a community does not engage in justice work as outreach, but as an expression of the inner work and the justice we seek for ourselves; justice in light of the gospel is reconciliation. It is not charity or "acts of service"—it is self-giving love, for life. Justice is not justification of self, but reconciling work. Justice is a way of being in faith and a way of life—just as all are reconciled in Christ, so our life together takes seriously the injustice that limits, captures, and binds God's gift of life. But how are we to know the way?

By the God who justifies the one who has faith, we trust that Christ, found in community, is the way, the truth, and the light. We engage. We show up. We step into the light of truth and wrestle with the darkness that clouds our vision and threatens our life together. We grow as people of faith and community in Christ. We are present to learn and live together. We discuss, we build relationships and understanding. We listen for God's word to us, in our context. We examine our life together and how God's Word speaks to us as a community, and sense our call. We gather and we commune, and we serve. And not just on Sundays. We cannot be a full community if the community is not fully present. We cannot have life together if we live apart.

Faith formation is our belief that grounding in God's love and reconciliation with one another and with God in Christ produces the justice we seek. It prompts us to further justice. We are not in the business of building "little Christians" but God creates "little Christs" of each of us. If we mean to convey Christ in our life together, our foundation in faith is God's work, proclaimed in scripture and in the life of Christ among us. And for that, we believe that we all are being formed in the faith.


Lutheran World Relief: Spring Collection Underway!


