Path Down the Mountain: Becoming Like Jesus and the Way of Lent

There is a deep sense of exhilaration when you reach the mountain peak, or the end of a hiking trail—often, the hike has been a journey to get to a panorama, a waterfall, a lake, or a summit. On a recent hike, though it was cold out—my favorite temperature for a hike—I was too layered, and too warm. And the path, winding around through a thicket, and seemingly devoid of people caused me to wonder all the time whether I was lost. I recalled Kerouac living in isolation, and happy at that. Traces of cooler air, bubbling runoff, and silent stillness gave me pause and my drive to press on in the expectation that I was on the right path. When I eventually reached the point, most of the view was obscured by clouds.

I could say more about the end of the hike, but that would not be the end of the story. To get home, I had to go back the way I came. I was not entirely disappointed—the walk was the point, but I did have to put myself in the head that the return journey was worth it if, for nothing else, I would have the patience to get back to my car and drive home. As I walked, I thought a while about how many other people had similar experiences—how many others walked this trail before me, and how it was maintained. I felt I had **become** like them, letting my stomping feet continue to keep the path from being lost in the thicket.

We are told throughout scripture to not only do as God commands, but also live in light of God's presence and works. God rests on the seventh day, and so do we. Christ "stands up" on the new day, and so we stand in imitation of the resurrection. But often we have other examples—Paul, Timothy, Peter, James, apostles, teachers, prophets, witnesses, followers, saints—we are told to imitate them, as they imitate Christ.

In a sense, we are told to become like Christ and live righteously. But righteousness is not without its struggle in a world of sin.

And, like we see in the Transfiguration, Jesus doesn't remain in the clouded mountain top. He rebukes Peter, who has his head (literally) in the clouds. (I can only imagine the patience and struggle they felt as they followed back down the mountain path.) What the disciples have sought in following Jesus is not revealed on this lonely and isolated mountain, away from the lives they know too well in the valleys below. **It is down the mountain, where Christ is revealed among the suffering of the world, and in his own struggles of living in this world as a human.**

In becoming like us, however, God gives us examples in our ways of life to imitate, and joins us with fellow wayfarers to clear and maintain the path that Christ has given us. We are given the mind for patience and heart for tenacity especially when life is arduous. We imitate or take on the mind of those who have lived in faith, trusting that God is bringing all to righteousness. We live in pursuit of growing in the image of Christ, and seeking to do righteousness in light of the truth of God with us in our shared humanity. **Christ becomes like us, so we can become like him.**

Right now, we may want to cling to a time when the mountaintop was all we wanted to know—there are too many layers to our knowledge of the truth and the ways of the world. But life is most realistic downhill, where paths are much more frequent, and not all converge in the places we seek to end up. We may want to hold on to a hope for restoration. But the reality of God's peace and glory is one that is revealed not in loftiness of returning to how things were, but **a new realization when the world is transfigured—transformed in the image of Christ Jesus—to become a complete and renovated creation.**

As we approach Lent, we follow a familiar path, and maintain a road that others have walked—the tradition of each week taking on the form of holy week. For example, Sundays are a reflection of Easter (when fasting and disciplines are suspended) and Fridays meant to be days of solemnity in light of the crucifixion. **Each week is a meditation on the path Jesus takes from triumphal entry to passion, and from death to resurrection.** To consider each week in such a way allows us to get in the head of those who walked this bittersweet road before, and to conform our thoughts to the experience of others.

As we take on this Lenten season anew, we imitate the Way of Christ and the ways it has been kept. **In seeking to become all the more the form of Christ in the world: we, the church become like the disciples before us, and follow Jesus down the mountain.**

Auction-Will not occur within this 6 month budget. Endowment-Will pay up to \$20,000 for expenses occurred for the faith formation position. Currently, those expenses are under budget and, therefore, the income from endowment funds are also under budget. Social Justice/Outreach-Our Redeemer's tithes 10% from regular offerings. As regular offerings were higher than anticipated, this expense line is also higher than anticipated. Summary: Our Redeemer's budgeted for a negative net income and ended the year with a positive net income. Our Redeemer's income was greater than estimated due to higher regular offerings along with lower expenses than budgeted, in part, because a staffing position was unfilled for a portion of the year. The Cottage Meeting will be held on February 1 to review the proposed 2026 mission budget, so we can come to the February 8th budget meeting feeling informed and aligned as a community.

Our Redeemer's Endowment Committee

For those that don't know me, I am **Betsy McGregor**. I'm writing today because I am a member of our church council and I want to highlight one of the ministries I support.

Many know I support our music and faith formation ministries. I also support another important ministry, our Endowment Committee. I want to share with you what this committee does for our members.



How Does the Endowment Committee Support Our Redeemers?

The Endowment Committee's mission is to support funding for projects, study, trips or other endeavors which further the mission of Our Redeemers. It is funded through donations and designated gifts from members.

In October of 2024 the Church Council approached the Endowment Committee to help seed funding for a part time Faith Formation Coordinator. The council determined the need for a Faith Formation Coordinator after a thorough review of all aspects of this work and what was required to provide programming for all ages and thus grow our church and its membership. Our church budget did not support a part-time Faith Formation Coordinator, and so the Council turned to the Endowment Committee who stepped in with bridging the financial gap of what was needed versus what we could afford. Endowment funds will provide the funding for a 3-year time period. The Faith Formation Coordinator position was filled in 2025 and after the three-year period, funding through Endowment will end.

There are other smaller ways that the Endowment Committee helps individuals. Any rostered member is invited to make an application for funds that they believe further our mission. Some examples of funding provided include scholarships to Holden Village, Vacation Bible School and other Church events that require payment, and college scholarships. The Endowment Fund can allocate up to 5% of its three-year average value.

The disbursements must meet the criteria of the Endowments' principles:


- To serve the purpose beyond being a capital reserve; to represent aspirational resources**
- To serve the purpose of alignment of the awareness and giving of our membership.**

The Officers of the Endowment Committee are: **Steve Cromwell** – Chairman; **Corey Cox** – Financial Secretary; **Jan Ward** – Recording Secretary.

Other members of the committee are **Earl Ecklund, Diana Myers, Pastor Thomas and Betsy McGregor** (in a non-voting role). Funding through 2027 is primarily committed via the Faith Formation position, however applications are always open and are available in the church office and online. When planning your estate giving, consider setting aside a percentage for the church endowment so that it can continue to support our members and our church.



Altar Task Force Update

In 2025, the Altar Task Force was convened by Council to discuss, discern, and seek a design and craftsperson for a new altar. Funds for the project, set aside during the renovation of the sanctuary, had been held for this purpose and were intended for an altar and other worship furniture (for example, a matching lectern or pulpit, or a baptismal font). Open to members for a period of time, the Task Force ultimately consisted of **Pastor Thomas, Marie Nordquist, Judy Malmgren, Stephanie Running, Tricia Kloth, Tamara Anderson, Guy Michaelson, and Chuck McKenzie**, with Marie serving as Chair and Pastor Thomas as Council representative. The design proposal was accepted and approved by Council in December, and the Task Force is now on pause while the project is being completed by the crafters. It will be called upon again in the future for the next piece.

Guided by principles conceived for the renovation, the piece is mobile and combines lightness with a solid platform, expressing the openness of the table of Christ while also emphasizing its place within the surrounding space. As a functional altar, size and shape were carefully considered, and utility for our celebrations and creative practices was also well discussed. The nearly year-long process resulted in a beautiful design that reflects features of the sanctuary, including arches and white oak. A simple Luther Rose in walnut will adorn the support structure.

Pastor Thomas will continue to serve as Liaison, but any member of the Task Force or Council can speak to the piece, the proposal, and the process. Illustrations and the approved proposal can be furnished (don't mind the pun) upon request through the office. We are excited to present this piece for our congregational life, and we offer our sincere thanks to the Task Force members who gave heart and soul to this project. A consecration of the new altar will be planned as part of a special Sunday service.



Help Out at Ballard Sunday Dinner—In Service to Our Neighbors





Holden Village Closed to Guests Summer 2026

According to a January 23rd press release by the Executive Directors of Holden Village, the retreat center will be closed to guests through at least summer 2026 due to damage to Forest Service Road (FSR) 8301 and the need for extensive repairs.
