From the Pastor...



I sit looking out over a very low tide. My whole view is nothing but swaths of green and bluish gray. Directly in front are dappled rocks, and just beyond, a field of neon seaweed covers the stony beach. The water placidly ripples, supporting a lone duck. Across the harbor, the darker greens of trees. Sky and water brighten and darken repeatedly and randomly. Crows proclaim their territory. Swallows dart. And I just sit. On a granite boulder. Huge boulders around me in just the right shape let me lean back and pray, and think, and restore my soul, sheltered somewhat from the falling mist and from the wind. All at once the old hymn my father loved, surfaces like a seal's smooth head breaking the water:

Rock of ages cleft for me, Let me hide myself in thee.

Sanctuary. That is what I am experiencing here. Sanctuary that restores me to myself. And gives me peace, quiet joy, and energy for what comes next.

How much we all need such times and places! These days are so full of change, uncertainty, turmoil, and frustrated, fervent hope for what must be different. It takes a lot out of us. Especially when we have to stay physically separate from each other.

When I ask myself if it is God's will we move forward with our vision-aligned renovation, moments like this remind me how essential soul restoration is for all of us to neighbors and members alike. And how hard it can be to find such places in our increasingly dense urban neighborhood! At the very same time, these pandemic days teach us the depth of our need for the human connection of our faith community—

no matter how many people swirl around us. I think how important Our Redeemer's steady work for the sanctuary, dignity and justice of every person is—whether unsheltered, rejected, or facing other challenges.

Spirituality. Community. Justice. Not just for our own sake. Or even for the sake of our children and grandchildren. But also for our neighbors, whose souls are also seeking restoration and also yearn for greater justice. A building that invites them into the life and hope and faith within our warm, risktaking, grace-filled community—where all are truly welcome—gifts, warts, pain, joys, mistakes, and all.

What a thrill we are so close to making this vision a reality! By itself, our renovated building would be nothing. But filled with community, ministries, and vision for this critical time? Our building will not be a shell, but the vessel and tool we and our neighbors need!

Thank you for prayerfully considering the materials sent to you and the call God has given us now and for the future. Please participate in our annual meeting, Sunday, July 12 at 1pm.

Claiming Our Story: White Privilege and Racial Justice

Sundays at 9:30am (Same Zoom# as Worship)

This is a rather ad hoc conversation, prompted by a variety of videos and resources available to help those of us who are white take a look at how, largely without our intention or even much knowledge, we have played a part in the continuing racial conflicts and inequality of our nation.

As followers of Jesus, we have a particular call to serve our neighbor...and, in this time and this somewhat removed place, to better understand the story that is all of our story, so that we can choose its ending, rather than continuing to play it out painfully over and over, without healthy, just resolution.

We've already looked at Brene Brown's very accessible, very truthful video talk after Charlottesville. She combines her psychological and research background to her down to earth, no-nonsense straight talk about white privilege. All in a way that keeps our defenses to a minimum. **Take a look at it: LINK**.

Next we'll be looking at the post-Civil War history, and the ways the emancipation proclamation was undercut and undermined right up until the Civil Rights Act, and beyond.

Our VBS this summer is obviously a little different, but it should be loads of fun! We are sad that we can't be together in person, but we will still be sharing our art and our ideas. We encourage you to <u>register</u>. It could just be your household, or it could be a few families from your block, or if you just have a playmate that would make VBS more fun for your child – whatever you're comfortable with hosting.

Here's how it works:

Each day we will gather on zoom for an opening time of songs and fun with Pastor Gretchen, and then you'll be off to the races with whomever you have invited to be part of your VBS. We check back in on zoom at lunch time to see what people learned, and to share what we've done.

There are six activities daily: Bible Story; Games; Music; Snack; Crafts; Community Crafts

You can do the activities in whatever order you want each day, except the first day when the craft comes first. The activities are designed for kids ages Kindergarten – 4th grade, and older kids make great helpers and game leaders. The whole family can pitch in!

Craft supplies and snack supplies will be assembled by volunteers for each hosting home. They will be dropped off the weekend before VBS.

Here are the daily themes we will be looking at for Being A Neighbor!

- Day 1: The Walls Fall Down People have always been willing to stand up for what they believe. The people in this story used trumpets to make their voices heard and bring God's love.
- Day 2: The Good Neighbor When someone is in need, we stop and help them. No matter how different they might be, we are to help them. That is what Jesus means by loving your neighbor. Your neighbors is anyone in need.
- Day 3: Talking Donkey God speaks to us in unexpected ways. Listen to the world around you. Listen to people. Listen to creation. Listen to your own heart
- Day 4: Jesus Stands Tall Standing up for others is how you be like Jesus. Jesus stepped in to help even if other people did not like that he did.

COVID-19 UPDATE

May/June, 2020

As Governor Inslee continues to assess King County's health, Our Redeemer's staff and leadership seeks to adapt and assess what works for our congregation, while providing as many safe opportunities for worship and people who watch the video later. Not only have and ministry as possible.

We are all yearning to worship together in person! So on June 21, we acted on the Governor's permission, and offered outdoor worship, with more than 6 feet of distance between worshipers, and each person bringing their own chair, communion elements, I-pad or cell phone for a bulletin. People registered ahead of time, giving contact information, and worshipers were checked in. Masks were required, and along with sanitizer, were available in abundance.

This was an entirely new venture for us, with on-line Zoom and Facebook live-streaming of the service. Those present in the parking lot were enthusiastic; those on-line found challenges with the sound. We are currently researching to see if there is a fix for the sound. If there is, we will have more outdoor services. If not, the amount of effort involved and the inability of on-line worshipers to really hear or participate, means we will need to wait until a Phase of the Governor's plan that will allow us to be inside in closer proximity.

MEANWHILE, it appears that "attendance" at our Sunday worship is at or beyond our usual average, when you include Zoom attendance, Facebook Livestream, a few folks from the neighborhood we have yet to meet in person begun joining us, and family members who live in other states, but also some people with challenges that make in-person attendance impossible. Our warmest welcome to all of them!

And, our Circles of Connection small groups are also continuing...with a few new circles each month. For those participating, reports are that this has been a wonderful opportunity to connect, check in, have some conversation and pray together. Our thanks to those who are helping make this happen. Meanwhile, our staff continues to deal creatively with our limitations. Be sure to check out all the Holden @ Home activities, volunteer as a leader for Vacation Bible School, or as a **Zoom Assistant** for our cottage and congregational meetings.

BUILD THE VISION... SHARE THE VISION

Our Redeemer's Lutheran Church

Vision Aligned Building (VAB) Update
June 23, 2020



The project continues to be on schedule and within the established budget. The building permit is issued; Grow and the P-Patch have signed off on their review contingency, the non-refundable deposit is with escrow, and closing is scheduled for mid-July. The general contractor has provided final pricing that is within budget, and the loan funding that will round out the financial package for the Church is approved.

The overall budget for the project includes a 10% construction contingency to be carried by the Church. This contingency is in addition to the smaller contingency carried by the general contractor in their bid. There is also another \$60K contingency for project-related costs. While this is a conservative approach, it intends to ensure the budget for the work manages the risks and is a maximum amount. If there are savings and some of these dollars are not needed, the loan portion of the funding package will be reduced accordingly. Since the loan funds will be the last dollars spent, this has the effect of potentially not advancing the full amount approved.


The next milestone is approval by the congregation at the vote scheduled for July 12. If approved, the Church will be signing a contract with LZL Construction, the general contractor, later in July and will begin the process of storage, salvage, and removal of the organ (which gets refurbished and reinstalled) to make way for the start of construction in mid-August.

Budget

The council approved the budget for the overall project in February 2020, and no significant changes have been needed.

Schedule

Phase 1.5 and 2.0 of the COVID-19 restrictions allow new construction projects to get underway. A safety plan for managing the work is required and submitted by LZL before work begins. The project remains on schedule, as presented to the congregation in February..

Helping with Hunger by Paula Hlastala

Feeding the hungry right now—it's an overwhelming proposition; the need is unprecedented. Food insecurity has a huge effect on people, taking an especially high toll on young people who need nourishment for critical stages of physical and emotional development.



I'd like to share a plan for a new kind of feeding program. It's a program I'm simply calling **FulFILLment**-- and though it's a work in progress, its mission is to serve families suffering with food insecurity, and to provide aid, comfort, and hope. In addition to our amazing social justice community at Our Redeemer's, I have found amazing partners at the Plus One Foundation. Although helping fight hunger has not been part of Plus One's specific mission, they agree with the social justice stance that it's hard to heal your heart, body and mind if you are hungry!

Once the program is up and running, FulFILLment distributions will be shipped to individuals across the U.S. regardless of race, religion, disability, or gender. They can apply for their household to receive a food box subscription in the form of a care package of shelf-stable, nutritious food along with notes of encouragement, small surprises, and recipes. Participants will receive 6 food boxes, with a shipment approximately every 2 weeks over the course of 3 months. (Or clients may also request a one-time delivery of single, larger box.) Using Priority Mail to get food to someone's mailbox takes the burden of time, energy and logistics off of the recipients.

Over the course of the subscription period, the main goal of FulFILLment is to provide families with healthy, non-perishable pantry staples, but another important goal is to develop a relationship with the people receiving care packages. After the subscription period of 3 months, those who request further assistance may be matched with other individuals or groups that would like to become pen pals of sorts, and the care packages and mutual correspondence might continue indefinitely.

If you are inspired to help people with food insecurity, please keep up with the social justice team at Our Redeemer's and their food-related activities. And if you have any comments about the FulFillment project or would like to keep posted as this program evolves, please visit this blog, and feel free to check out Plus One's web page https://www. plusonefoundation.org/ and join their mailing list, or contact me directly at paulala343@ hotmail.com. I'm hoping our first trial of 50 participants will be able to receive their introductory care packages in the near future!

I'm not sure where this road will lead, but grateful to be taking steps down that path - eager to see what FulFILLment might bring for folks in our community and beyond.

Statement of Intent, Solidarity, and of Hope

As with most of you, the Social Justice Team has been wrestling with how to respond to the recent racist murders in our country by law enforcement. We have long discussed race as a central concern, but have felt unsure how to bring others along with us as we follow the path of Jesus. Right now, we believe, is a time to **Show up! Speak Up! Stand Up!** And so, we, together, crafted this response and call to action for all who care about God's beloved community here and around the world. We are in agreement, all who were part of the process, that this is a good statement, and one worthy of recognition and support.

This is a statement of intent, of solidarity, and of hope for our church's engagement in being an active part of the solution to racism as an inclusive, welcoming congregation. We know a statement means little if there are no actions that spring from it and we are looking forward to being involved in prioritizing racial justice as a central piece of God's call to us in this season. It is interesting that in this "building season", what feels like a fairly inward focus, we are also being called to "build out". We are hands on, ears tuned, committed to change ourselves and our world. We have begun conversations about having a task group for racial justice. Please consider if you would like to participate.

We believe this is God's call to us in this season. **But we do not walk alone.** As the African proverb goes, "If you want to go fast, go alone; if you want to go far, go together".

This statement is an evolving document reflecting the hearts and intentions of an evolving people; written by members of Our Redeemer Lutheran Church's Social Justice Team.

We stand in the wake of another barrage of violence against black people in the United States. Ahmaud Arbery, Breonna Taylor, Manuel Ellis, and George Floyd are the victims we are aware of who have died while in police custody since March 6, 2020. Last week Robert Fuller was found hanging on a tree in the Palmdale town square. After centuries of racist policy that took root with the enslavement of African people for profit, we are finally awakening to the realities of individual and systemic racism and discrimination.

The Social Justice team believes Black Lives Matter. We also believe God is calling us at this moment to show up, speak up, and stand up to racial injustice and white supremacy in ourselves, our communities, our country, and our world. We are In agreement with the ELCA recent statement on racial justice which states, among other things:

- · White supremacy is racism and we condemn it
- The love of God is for all people, without exception, and we proclaim it
- The justice and mercy of God are for all people, without exception, and we proclaim this
- We are called by Jesus to "love our neighbors as ourselves." Therefore proclaim our commitment to speak with one voice against racism and white supremacy.
- We call all congregations of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America to engage in communal study of the structures and rhetoric that empower and fuel racism and white supremacy and to take to heart the teaching of Scriptures, so we may all be better equipped to speak boldly about the equal dignity of all persons (Condemnation of White Supremacy and Racist Rhetoric Social Policy Resolution CA19.04.18)

And in alignment with the vision statement of ORLC:

"In the model of Christ and for the life of the world, we are an inclusive, devoted, caring, and spiritual community that accepts challenges, takes risks and grows."

We believe God is calling Our Redeemers to an intentional season of self-reflection, discernment, and action to begin to reckon with the violence of racism and white supremacy in our personal and shared lives. We suggest a one-year commitment to begin. We will undertake and encourage our congregation to commit to this in the following ways and others as we learn:

- Repentance We will humbly examine our thoughts, beliefs, and actions. We will confess our sin, offer accountability and grace to others and ourselves, and change our behavior through worship, prayer, and daily choices.
- Education We will seek out multiple ways to educate ourselves about our privilege(s) and listen to God and our neighbors especially the voices of those most impacted by the sin of white supremacy. We see this as a life-long task for all ages.
- Advocacy We will deepen our support for our partners and other organizations that work closely with People of Color (POC). We will address racial justice and equity through policy changes, by standing alongside those most at risk, and by amplifying voices of Black, Indigenous and People of Color (BIPOC). We will continue to seek out ways as we discover them.

Finally, we celebrate this pilgrimage together as a living testimony to God's grace and persistence in building the beloved community. We see this as a living document to be adapted as we grow in understanding of our privilege and the ways we are complicit. We expect that we will make mistakes and be uncomfortable. We are willing to grow and change. We are willing to do the hard work with the Holy Spirit as our guide until all people are treated with their deserved respect. We look forward to the day when all of God's children can be liberated and we can thrive together.


