

From the Pastor...



"Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they neither toil nor spin, ²⁹yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not clothed like one of these. ³⁰But if God so clothes the grass of the field, which is alive today and tomorrow is thrown into the oven, will he not much more clothe you—you of little faith?" – Matthew 6

In March as the days finally grow longer and all the flowers start to bloom, hope can spring up in us that perhaps we too will blossom. We have been buried in the cocoon of the work of our transition for a while now, and we still have a ways to go. Our Call Committee is beginning their work with Pastor Andy Yee – assistant to the bishop from our synod office. We have been asked to pray for them daily as they meet and make decisions that will impact our life together, and how we navigate God's will for us in the world. That seems like a doable task, no?

Lent encourages introspection and observation. I love the passage from the Gospel of Matthew about worry, and how it reminds me to put things in perspective. I often feel there are things I can control, and things I can't. Mostly though, I can't.

And as Lent and Good Friday remind us, it's best to turn toward God and remember to put our trust in God's will, rather than our mortal wisdom.

As a congregation of people who have been brought together at this time and this place by the movement of God's spirit in our lives, it behooves us to take this season of Lent and this burgeoning of spring to pause, breathe, and settle. Here are some ideas to get you started:

- Sit in the warm sun and be comforted. As you do, remember Jesus' time in the desert. Pray for stamina for yourself and this congregation.
- Get up close to a budding tree where you can see the brightness of the new life. Pray for the growth you are feeling as a person, and that we are feeling as a congregation.
- Walk near a body of water and listen to its movement.
 Pray that your spirit would be renewed for life and endurance.
- Help someone accomplish something that has no benefit for you. Pray, and remember how much God has done for you.

We are exactly where we are meant to be in this moment, and God is with us.

Holy Week Preview

Holy Week this year will continue to be framed by our Lenten theme, "Seeking." As we search for our place in the story of Jesus' death and resurrection, we pray for new insights into where we might find a new life where we thought there might only be suffering and death. Thanks be to God!

April 2: Palm/Passion Sunday - "Where Are You Headed?"

Beginning outside with palms and processing, we will then move into the sanctuary for the telling of the passion narrative and remember the story of Jesus' journey to the cross in love and loyalty to God and all of humanity. This service contains many emotions from joy and elation at the procession of the Humble King, to the agony of his death in the crucifixion.

April 6: Maundy Thursday - "Will You Wash My Feet?"

We will start our evening at **6:00 pm** with "Soup and Stories" – a potluck dinner of soup and homemade bread. Each family is invited to bring a pot of homemade soup from their family's history. Then we will share a story related to the soup. Following our meal, we will begin our liturgy with foot-washing, followed by communion and the stripping of the altar. This is a wonderful interactive service remembering the last supper of Jesus and his disciples.

April 7: Good Friday - "Why Have You Forsaken Me?"

7:00 pm - Our service of Tenebrae (Shadows) is a candlelight service remembering and reflecting on the last words of Christ through prayer, music, and silence. This moving service is deeply rooted in the tradition of the church, and is beautiful and moving.



April 7-8: Good Friday - 24-hour Prayer Vigil

Beginning at **noon on Good Friday, and continuing until noon on Holy Saturday,** we invite individuals to sign up to pray for an hour in our prayer chapel. It is a time to remember the world, pray for mercy and healing, and to find solace in our sanctuary. There is a deep sense of the sacred when one is praying in the dark and quiet of the middle of the night while we remember Christ's death and burial. Details about signing up will be coming soon.

April 9: Easter Sunday – "Who Are You Looking For?" Sunrise Service – 6:30 am in Carkeek Park

Join us in the wee hours of the morning for a service of light and resurrection! We will welcome new members, celebrate holy baptism and communion, and rejoice and be glad. He is risen indeed! 

Artists' Statement: In seven verses, the gospel writer tells us that a man born blind is given sight. But after that, the narrator devotes thirty-three verses to the details of disagreement that swell after the healing takes place. I used to find this second part of the story tedious and exhausting. In a world with constant conflict, I'm tired of listening to endless bickering.

However, this second half of the story makes me realize that this encounter is hardly about physical healing or literal blindness. It's about how harmful theology can prevent us from seeing people—truly seeing them. It's about how our narrow imagination can harden into accusation and blame. It's about how we can be threatened by new ideas or shifts in someone's identity. It's about how our doctrine can lead to exile. Ultimately, it's a story about our resistance to change. Can this be a cautionary tale for us?

In this image, hands expressing denial and exclusion press in on the man. In the background, I wrote a barrage of questions I imagine emerging from the crowd: Why did God heal you? What did you do to cause this? Who sinned? Alongside those questions, I wove in contemporary statements I've heard spoken in situations when we think a tidy rationale will comfort us: Everything happens for a reason. God only gives you as much as you can handle. Pray harder.

I wonder what this story would look like had better questions been asked. What if his neighbors had instead asked the blind man, "How do you feel?" What if the man had asked the crowd, "What are you afraid of?" What if the Pharisees had asked one another, "What if it's time to

Surrounded by remnants of narrow vision, the man has new insight. He looks beyond the words, beyond the crowd, beyond the accusations driving him out of town. Can we seek understanding without denigrating or objectifying humans in the process? - Rev. Lisle Gwynn Garrity

Removing the special one-time gift, the church's expenses and income show a positive net profit of \$43,906. Expenses coming in at \$72,692 under budget contributed to this high net profit.

Confirmation Class Tackles Questions of Faith

The confirmation class has continued to explore Jesus' life and Lutheran theology tackling questions such as the meaning of evil, salvation by grace, and how this all relates to our lives today. Students have engaged in



conversations about the legalistic view of salvation in the Old Testament, and the path to salvation through Jesus in the New Testament. For example, in discussing the concept of 'who is our neighbor', we highlighted a stark difference in Jesus teaching the 2nd most important commandment is "love thy neighbor," as opposed to the legalistic view guiding the 10 commandments listed in the Old Testament.

Whenever possible we guide the topics, relating to current events, social and economic issues, and other topics of concern the class has shared with us. These discussions are enriched by the varied thoughts, opinions, and lived experiences each youth brings to class. The confirmation team approaches these conversations as a blend of facilitator, information giver, and even questioner, with respect given that these youth are on their own faith journey's, and growing in their individual relationships with God.


