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From the Pastor...



Now the whole group of those who believed were of one heart and soul, and no one claimed private ownership of any possessions, but everything they owned was held in common.

With great power the apostles gave their testimony to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus, and great grace was upon them all.

There was not a needy person among them, for as many as owned lands or houses sold them and brought the proceeds of what was sold. They laid it at the apostles' feet, and it was distributed to each as any had need.

There was a Levite, a native of Cyprus, Joseph, to whom the apostles gave the name Barnabas (which means 'son of encouragement'). He sold a field that belonged to him, then brought the money and laid it at the apostle's feet. (Acts 4:32-37)

This reading was part of my devotions this morning.*

It's a description of the earliest Christians. Believing the resurrection of Jesus truly had happened, they formed an exceptional community. They shared freely all they had, received freely when they were in need, and freely shared the stories of how they were seeing God was raising up new life in and all around them.

My favorite part of the passage is Joseph, nicknamed Barnabas – which means 'son of encouragement.' I can picture Barnabas clearly – maybe because I've met him so many times in the kind word, the perceptive glance that tells me I or another have been seen or appreciated, the willingness to go a second mile, the sturdy forbearance with another's foibles, the faithful year-in and year-out commitment to putting others first, that weathers the best of times and the worst of times.

In other words, Barnabas is us. Now more than ever.

I like the questions my devotion posed. I invite you to take a moment to ponder them:

Perhaps you are missing meeting with your church in person at the moment. Share with the Lord now all the things for which you are grateful about your Christian community.

A key idea seems to be sharing. Those with plenty give freely to support those in need. Recall times when this kind of sharing has formed part of your own Christian discipleship.

Joseph...is nicknamed... "son of encouragement". Are you able to be an encouraging son or daughter to those around you? Or is there someone you can think of who encourages you in this way?

For a moment or two speak to God about how you might help to build up [your community] today.

What hopeful reminders! Even though we're separated, you and I can be "sons and daughters of encouragement" to our neighbors and to one another, freely sharing and receiving encouragement, gifts, and grace.

Just like the earliest Christians, Our Redeemer's is an Easter community – living in the hope because Jesus has been raised and is present with us now. And just like that community, I see "great grace is upon us all".



Thanks be to God! Christ is risen! Alleluia!

FAITH FORMATION

Faith Formation Update by Betsy McGregor, Faith Formation Team Facilitator

In April the Faith Formation Team met for an in depth discussion of our vision and long term goals for Faith Formation at Our Redeemer's. We used a variety of tools to help us with our work. Documents such as our Strategic Plan, the recent Vitality Survey results, conversations with members who were at Holden Village last July and vital input from Paster Kathy and Pastor Gretchen informed our decisions. Together with our consultant, Jim La Doux, we believe we have a clear path forward in supporting Faith Formation for all members of our church. Central to our goals is supporting a habit of faith practices beyond Sunday worship, particularly for youth and families with young children. With the current situation regarding COVID-19, planning specific events and opportunities is difficult. With this in mind, we have some things we look forward to rolling out to the church in the near future and will announce them as they are confirmed.

Circles of Connection

Our pastors are working to form up intentional groups of folks to stay connected to each other. Groups will meet by zoom at set weekly dates and times (as they schedule individually). Each group will have the following purpose:

- Check in remind each other of your names, and then answer one question to help you know each other well.
- Dig deep Join in conversation around a short list of questions based on the pastor's sermon from the previous Sunday.
- Pray Pray extemporaneously or using a set prayer from a list of choices. Include specific prayer requests from within your group.

VAB Monthly Update

Our renovation continues to push forward through the COVID-19 restrictions. SHKS Architects has finalized the drawings and LZL Construction will be bidding the work in late April, early May. The City of Seattle is nearing completion on the building permit review and it is anticipated the permit will be issued in May. The sale of the P-Patch is progressing and although fundraising for them has become more challenging, they



received a \$250,000 grant from "Washington State Local Projects" and submitted their application for the King County Conservation Futures Grant.

The Vision Aligned Building (VAB) project has its own new page on the Church website: <u>https://ourredeemers.</u> <u>net/about/build-the-vision/</u>. The intent is to use this page to keep everyone up to date on the design progress, schedule, budget, opportunities for involvement, and construction.

Marceau Pipe Organ Builders has been working with the Church over the past month to refine their scope of work and design for the new design. The organ will be completely removed from the building and taken to their shop for refurbishment. The new organ will be installed with the console on the chancel and the pipes in the reduced balcony.


The team is also working on proposals for design and installation of the new Audio-Visual systems for the building. These will include projectors, screens, and a sound system in the sanctuary, as well as some A/V equipment in small meeting rooms and the fellowship hall.

Budget

The council approved the budget for the overall project in February 2020 and there have been no significant changes, only minor adjustments to date.

Schedule

Assuming some resolution on the COVID-19 issues and the sale of the P-Patch per the terms of the PSA (close by 7/15/2020), construction could start as early as July/August of 2020 and finish early to mid-summer 2021.

Do you set aside time for prayer? Here are some resources for you to explore and use during our trying times. Blessings on your time with God.

- **Pray As You Go:** An app with a daily 10–14 minute music/scripture/prayer prompt, but also prayer tools for breathing, special prayer focuses on anxiety, loneliness, insomnia, etc. The readers have lovely, (usually) non-stuffy voices.
- **Christ in Our Home Devotions:** With this current health crisis, some people may be without a physical copy of Christ in Our Home. To assist with devotional life during this time, a limited-time complementary email subscription is being offered. Sign up and receive the daily devotional to your email for the remainder of March and April 2020. Sign up here.
- **Unfolding Light Unfolding Light** is a daily reflection (weekdays) by Steve Garnaas-Holmes rooted in a contemplative, Creation-centered, justice-oriented spirituality. unfoldinglight.net.
- **Celtic Christianity and Music Facebook Group:** They describe themselves as "a Sanctuary with a Celtic soul. We hope to encourage you with posts that reflect God in our world. Through music. Through prayers both new and ancient. Through poetry and prose.a community of care...celebrating and living out the unconditional love Christ has for all creation."
- **Centering Prayer App:** Create your own quiet time, with an opening prayer, beginning sound (lute, gong, bells, etc.) how long you would like to enter silence, and then an ending sound to let you know when the time is complete.
- Our Redeemer's Spiritual Life-hack Group: Not specifically for prayer, but frequently inspirational. And perhaps we can share what prayer practices and prayers are especially helpful to us right now.




One of my Lenten practices this year was to start praying the daily offices (that means small moments of prayer at morning, noon, and evening/night). As we moved from Lent to Eastertide, I have kept up this practice. I have found that it is a helpful rhythm for each day. It adds structure, during a time when everything feels fluid and unstable.

Now, in all honesty, I haven't prayed every single office on every single day. Some days, it feels too hard to stop and pray. Somedays I completely forget. But, here is what I know: rhythms are still rhythms even when I miss a couple steps. Rhythms aren't defined by the misses, the exceptions; they are defined by the continuation of their work.

Here are a couple of tools that I have used for praying the daily offices:

- Luther's Small Catechism morning and evening prayers from Martin Luther. This
