From the Pastor...



Revelation 21:1-5a

Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth; for the first heaven and the first earth had passed away, and the sea was no more. ²And I saw the holy city, the new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband. ³And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying,

'See, the home of God is among mortals.

He will dwell with them;
they will be his peoples,
and God himself will be with them;

⁴ he will wipe every tear from their eyes.
Death will be no more;
mourning and crying and pain will be no more,
for the first things have passed away.'

⁵ And the one who was seated on the throne said, 'See, I am making all things new.'

Have you ever had that feeling where it seems like everything you know is wrong? I feel that way often! There is something immensely comforting about a familiar song, or a dance that you know the steps to, or making a familiar dinner from a recipe that you have memorized. You know how it's supposed to go, and you know the order of operations. It's soothing to fall into the rhythms and patterns of a well-worn routine. I find that as we mature, we start to yearn for things that go the way they should, and we can be completely discombobulated when a wrench is thrown into our works.

So often in the church we talk about God doing something new as a sign of hope, a sign of new life, and a sign of good things to come. But what about when doing a new thing means losing something you cherish, or finding out that you were wrong about something? What if doing a new thing means feeling like all your life experience and learning was for nothing? I sometimes find myself praying "Seriously God? I was just getting the hang of this [relationship, technology, routine, space...], and now it's switching into something scary and different. Can't I just have my old ways and stay here?"

But that is not God's way. We are called to continue learning and growing and changing – even when we think we might have learned enough. Having the familiar, the routine, and the patterned is not a bad thing, but God is bigger and wants more for us than just "the usual." So brace yourself! Because God is doing a new thing, right here, at Our Redeemer's. And while I may not be totally ready (and you might not be either!), I know that God is faithful, and that we are called and sent to be God's hands in the world.

Your Monthly Vision-Aligned Building Update

PURCHASE AND SALE AGREEMENT IS RATIFIED!

On Sunday, January 26, Our Redeemer's voted 93 to 7 to enter into a purchase and sale agreement with GROW (representing Ballard P-Patch). The P-Patch gardeners ratified the sale the same afternoon by a similar overwhelming margin.



The PSA includes a \$1,950,000 purchase price and \$50,000 non-refundable escrow monies, due on June 1, 2020. The sale will close on July 15, allowing our construction to begin this year before the rains come.

Because the P-Patch's funding depends so heavily on grants, and the timelines and amounts ultimately granted are uncertain, Our Redeemer's, with the full knowledge and endorsement of GROW/P-Patch, will work to have a "Plan B" offer ready in case the P-Patch cannot commit to escrow monies by June.

If that does happen, another congregational vote would be held to consider the "Plan B" deal. But we all sincerely hope that will not be the case!

Our sincerest thanks to our Church Council—especially Mike Hlastala; our administrator, Karie Stearns; and Pastor Hawks, for all the extra meetings and effort throughout December and January that were necessary to negotiate this deal and communicate it to the congregation.

Design

Our architects, SHKS, continue to detail the drawings. No review comments have yet been received from the City of Seattle, although they are overdue. A more detailed drawing set was provided to the contractor for an estimate update, which unfortunately, had to be postponed two weeks until February 17.



Budget

Understandably, our congregation, Council and the Vision-Aligned Building team are all anxious to know what budget will be necessary for our upgrades and renovations. Based on the initial contractor's estimate and estimated soft costs (like engineers, haz-mat, testing and inspections, moving costs, temporary facilities during construction, etc.), the current costs are well above the original budget.

As a result, Council is gathering information to be able to recommend a firm budget to the congregation at our February 16 presentation. They are reviewing capital campaign pledges fulfilled and yet to be fulfilled, looking at project scope, possible loans and an extension of our capital campaign.

Ash Wednesday





Lent Devotional 2020

Beginning March 1st, you are invited to venture through the wilderness with our devotional from Sanctified Art. Beginning with Ash Wednesday and ending with Easter Sunday, this devotional includes art, poetry, prompts, and reflections inspired by the Lenten lectionary scriptures (year A) and the theme, Wilderness.

"Lent begins in the wilderness. The Spirit guides Jesus into the wilderness where he comes face to face with temptation and struggle. Yet, in his forty days of fasting, resisting, and wandering, Jesus is shaped and formed for ministry. Similarly, through the wilderness of Lent, we are invited to surrender to the wild leadings of the Spirit. We rarely enter the wilderness willingly, but hopefully through our wandering we remember who we are and whose we are. The wilderness can become sacred even if it remains dangerous. There is no wilderness space too harsh or threatening for God's love. This Lent, we welcome you to the journey."

If you would like a paper copy of the booklet, a few will be available at church. To cut down on costs and prevent environmental harm, we'd like to keep printing to a minimum.

Also available are a new resource, daily devotional cards.

WHAT IT IS:

48 devotional cards with a word for the day and a scripture verse and short prayer. Print, cut, and select a card each day of Lent beginning with Ash Wednesday through Easter Sunday.

HOW TO USE IT:

- Select a card a day (order doesn't matter), contemplate the words for the wilderness, and read the scripture verse and short prayer.
- Get creative and display your words in a fun way—adhere the cards to a fridge or wall, create a fun wall hanging, or arrange them on a desk or table. Display the cards so you can continue journeying with the words throughout the entire season of Lent.
- This is a great daily devotional for middle & high school youth, college students, young adults, and adults of all ages—especially those in search of a short and sweet spiritual practice they can sustain for 48 days.



Her newest volume, just released, is co-edited with Margaret Bullitt-Jonas: Rooted and Rising: Voices of Courage in a Time of Climate Crisis. It contains essays from a cross section of faith leaders and activists offering their spiritual wisdom and energy for facing the difficult days ahead (Rowman & Littlefield, 2020). 
Black History Month

In observance of Black History Month, we celebrate the history of the Black Lutheran movement.

Jehu Jones, Jr., was a black slave and minister born in Charleston, SC. He was named after his father, Jehu Sr., a tailor who gained his freedom in 1798 and later became a businessman, opening an exclusive hotel in Charleston.

Jones, became a member of St. John's Lutheran Church in Charleston in the 1820s. He was ordained twelve years later, in 1832. He later became a missionary to Liberia to accompany freed slaves to Africa. He returned to Charleston after his ordination and was jailed briefly for violating South Carolina's law prohibiting the immigration of free blacks.

He settled in Philadelphia, which was the largest city in the country at the time. In June 1833, the Pennsylvania Ministry determined that Jones should be appointed to labor as a Missionary among the colored people in Philadelphia under the direction.



The St. Paul congregation that Jones founded in Philadelphia decided to build a church and solicit support from other Lutheran congregations. Throughout Jones' life in Philadelphia, he was active in the social and political life of the city. He organized a convention at Temperance Hall with the intent of uniting free blacks to petition local authorities for civil rights in 1845. He was also active in the Moral Reform and Improvement society, an association of black churches in the city dedicated to improving the social conditions of blacks. Jehu Jones died in 1852.



Social Justice January 2020 Update: A Path of Hands and Heart and Mind

The. Social Justice Team at Our Redeemer's is always considering how to live our faith in creative and practical ways for the "life of the world". We know God calls us to make a difference in our church, our communities, and our world. Together we get to figure out how.

This spring, we continue to do this work by fostering educational opportunities, faithfully partnering with organizations who strengthen our impact, and by participating in actions that deepen our effectiveness and understanding. Three percent of the funds that we raise as a congregation go to this important work. Here is what we are up to:

- We are wrapping up a series on immigration this February with Michael Ramos, the Executive Director of the Church Council of Greater Seattle. Following the Gospel of Christ, we hope to discern what we might do to support those most impacted by war and poverty who enter our country.
- We are learning how to be better advocates by participating in advocacy trainings and events in Olympia (Feb 6) and Washington DC (April 23–27).
- We coordinate Ballard Sunday Dinner the 3rd Sunday of each month, to provide a warm meal to our homeless and under-homes neighbors.
- We walk in the MLK Rally and March and participate in PRIDE every year.
- We have an amazing recycling event twice/year (look for details in March for the Spring event)
- We are excited to retreat together to clean up a beach on the ocean April 17–19.
- We support some of our neighbors living in cars, offering them a stable place to land for a season as they move toward more suitable housing.
- We are listening to political efforts to push war agendas and induce instability, staying particularly tuned to those in the U.S. and abroad who are affected by such aggressions (Iran, Iraq, Venezuela, and more).

This month, we authorized some of our regular partner support:

- Ballard Food Bank \$1,000
- Bridge Care Center \$500
- Neighbor in Faith \$500
- Earth Ministry \$500
- Faith Action Network \$500 (we have \$1,000 set aside, but I held back \$500 to support their annual fundraising dinner in the fall)
- Church Council of Greater Seattle \$500
- Lutheran Peace Fellowship \$500

Last year, the Council granted money to 3 participants who went to Washington DC for Ecumenical Advocacy. We discussed saving \$2,000 to support continued learning and movement in this event that embodies our primary values of education, partnership, and advocacy.


