#### FROM THE PASTOR...



I attended Luciafest last night. My 20th time. At one point, only Christmas tree lights twinkled in the dark, and although Marie Nordquist was in the pulpit, no one was speaking. Or singing. All I could hear were wiggles and coughs. We all sat uneasily like this for a while. Finally, the boy in the pew behind me whispered loudly, "Nothing's happening!!!" I turned and pointed him toward the back of the church, where I hope what you do brings you joy...or at least a row of girls dressed in white, were silently passing candlelight to one another. He said with a big smile, "Oh! SOMETHING's happening!!!"

OFTEN—that's how it is. Looking in front of us, we can't see anything happening, and assume NOTHING's going on. Or watching what's in front of us, we have no clue that things happening behind the scenes are at believed important things happen in the dark, behind least as important as what we came for.

OFTEN—that's how it is. Especially in church. I see it daily.

I see volunteers working to recruit and plan for the 130 additional volunteers it takes to host our Community Thanksqiving Dinner. I hear the hours of hand bell, orchestra, ensemble, and choir rehearsals for Christmas services, but also weekly. Each Sunday, I watch people pour gallons of water into big pots, for coffee we drink without giving a second thought. Our Caring Community Team sends cards, and makes visits, calls, and meals, and no one is the wiser...except for those blessed by their quiet efforts. I approach the altar every week, never wondering: "Will the wine and bread (and grape juice and gluten-free wafers) \ be ready for God's people?" They always are... and at 11AM they have been prepared by the same three women\* for longer than my 19 years here! The beautiful quilts appearing twice a year for us to bless and send around the globe, are the creation of a small but mighty weekly group. Church Council and Vision-

Aligned Building team work largely unseen. Sunday School teachers, Ballard Sunday Dinner, our financial secretaries, confirmation parents, ... I COULD fill this whole newsletter with ALL that's happening behind the scenes here.

I bet you are a volunteer working behind the scenes. satisfaction! Know this: What you do IS ministry, not just prelude to ministry. Your "backstage labors" are every bit as amazing as the finished gift you help make possible.

On January 6, we will enter Epiphany season, celebrating the wisdom of the Magi (wise ones), who the scenes. So, after everyone else had gone to sleep, they looked up into the darkness, and set out, following a star to an obscure barn, where the real event was taking place... "behind the scenes."

Thank you for doing as the Magi did, offering Christ so many of your gifts of time, talent, and treasure behind the scenes. Because of you, our congregation shines the light of God's truth and grace into the darkness. And people suddenly realize where they least expected it: "SOMETHING'S happening!"

### **Creative Ways to Live Generously**

People at Our Redeemer's are always giving - year round - of time, energy, skills, and financial resources. Such generous living allows us to serve God, bless one another and care for those in great need, near and far.

If you have not yet fulfilled your pledge, or find yourself moved to give a special year-end gift, you might want to look into these options:

#### Charitable distributions from IRAs

Minimum retirement distributions are required for those 70–1/2 and older and for those who have inherited an IRA. These distributions can be gifted to the Church. A charitable gift deduction cannot be taken, but this can reduce one's tax basis – even if you don't itemize. This does qualify as all (or part) of the required minimum distribution from an IRA, and may result in some tax savings.

#### Gifts of Stock

Increased stock prices make gifts of appreciated stock attractive this year. Please contact the church office for instructions on making a direct transfer of stocks and mutual funds. If you have held them for at least one year, the full value of the stock can be used as a charitable gift, and taxes are not owed on capital gains.

Please remember to contact the our Parish Administrator, Karie Stearns, at administrator@ ourredeemers.net or 206-783-7900 (x107) if you are making a stock gift to make sure we know who the donor is and to the fund(s) the gift should be applied.

### **Baptism of Our Lord**

In the season following the Sunday of the Epiphany, twelve days following Christmas, the weeks of the liturgical year are bookended by two significant moments of change in Jesus' life and ministry. The first is his baptism, which happens in the River Jordan by the hand of his cousin John the Baptizer. The



second is the transfiguration, where, James, John, and Peter accompany Jesus to the top of a mountain, where Jesus is changed into sparkling white garments, with his face shining like the sun. On the way down the mountain, Jesus begins the road to Jerusalem, and his path toward Easter.

As we move through this season, hearing the stories of Jesus' life and ministry, we are invited to reflect on our own paths, and the life we are called to through baptism. Beginning with the calling we hear echoed through our own baptisms in the words of God spoken over Jesus, "This is my son, the Beloved, with whom I am well pleased," we can begin to imagine that our path of purpose, meaning, and intention are not unlike Christ's – to heal the sick, feed the hungry, lift up the children, and remember the poor.

### **Epiphany Eve - January 5th**

On Sunday, January 5 we will be celebrating Epiphany Eve, anticipating the arrival of the magi, the giving of gifts, and the return of light to our lives by the following of the star.

We will be welcoming **David De Block Wells** as our guest preacher and adult forum facilitator. David is the current Treasurer for Lutheran Campus Ministry at the University of Washington (LCMUW). He joined the Board of Directors in February of 2014 and has helped discern the multiple transitions they've been tackling over the past few years.

Some members might remember that he attended from 2010-2012 before moving on to a ministry position at Central Lutheran Church in Seattle. In 2017 he left his position to pursue a Masters in Transformational Leadership at Seattle University's School of Theology. After graduating this past June, he continues to stay busy working with LCMUW, working with the King County Academy of Family Physicians, and waiting tables at Place Pigalle in Pike's Place Market.

Join us for worship at 9am and 11am, and the Adult Forum at 10am on January 5th.



## Your Monthly Vision-Aligned Building Update

The members of the Vision-Aligned Building Team and Church Council have invested many hours this month, even though it is the heart of the Advent/Christmas season.

Representatives of GROW, the Ballard P-Patch leadership, and Our Redeemer's sat down on Monday, December 16, to listen and understand the concerns



and needs each of us have, as we continue to a purchase and sale agreement.

As has been the case all along, we all brought good faith, trust and candor to our conversation. Our Redeemer's learned more about the uncertainties and timelines relating to the government grants necessary for the purchase, and also more details about what is involved in GROW (the P-Patch's fiscal agent) obtaining a bridge loan.

We parted with a commitment to meet again as soon as possible, on December 30. If all goes as hoped, we hope to bring a purchase and sale agreement to the congregation for a vote as soon as possible in January. Having a signed purchase and sale agreement will aid the P-Patch in attracting significant donations. Even with the short timeline, we will work to provide a number of opportunities, written and conversational, for members to understand this important agreement.

Meanwhile, the Vision-Aligned Building Team met with our architects, SHKS, on December 11. They continue to implement renovation priorities growing out of our strategic plan. The meeting focused on the exterior of our renovation, including a first draft of landscape planning.

Sometime in January, we hope to have updated preliminary design drawings for the congregation to enjoy. An in-depth presentation of fully developed renderings and solid budget are planned for the afternoon of Sunday, February 16. That presentation will allow ample time, and will include virtual reality designs!

Stay tuned. There is a great deal of work going on, and before long your input and vote will be needed to help determine Our Redeemer's direction for generations to come.

### **Road to Housing Update**




